Walt presented information about the 4<sup>th</sup> Annual F.AS.T. ride for August 17<sup>th</sup>. This is a 150 mile ride that benefits sufferers of Fetal Alcohol Syndrome. They are raffling a 2008 Harley Super Glide

It starts at 9:00 am and goes for 3 to 3-1/2 hours with continental brunch.

Tom Malia provided the safety tip. He was in slow traffic in downtown Barrington recently when an accident happened behind him. The same type of accident happened to a friend of his a few years ago. Someone had allowed a car to turn into his lane through a gap in a line of opposing traffic. The driver pulled out in front of Tom's friend giving him no visibility with the time to react. He slid underneath the car and long story short is okay today. Be careful by slowing, improving your site lines and

being aware to avoid these situations.

Tom Malia then presented the first of a 2 part course on electronic navigational aides. The second session will be on global positioning systems. The presentation was on Mapping Software. They can be used to develop routes, test options, communicate with others and input to GPS systems. Tom demonstrated building a map on a projected laptop with Microsoft Streets and Maps software.

While pre-rides are always required for a Top Cat ride, map-

ping software can assist greatly. You can verify timing, note hazards, locations and explore interesting diversions. Rest/gas stops, destination review and route refinement can all be done on your computer. You also can produce copies of route overview and turn-by-turn instructions all on Maps and Streets.

The meeting adjourned at approximately 9:20PM. The 50/50 raffle was won by a guest.

I was doing work on some Top Cats images the other day when I ran across two of my favorite motorcycle photos from my personal archives. They were taken 31 years apart. Each brought back memories of my earlier days of motorcycling, but most of all they reminded me that I have always been fortunate to have one *cool* mom.

Picture #1: Flashback 37 years ago to St. Louis, Missouri. The year is 1971. That dapper dude is me at 18. The cute little number next to me is not my girlfriend. It is my mother. A little over a year prior to this picture, my father died suddenly, leaving my mom, not only to deal with her own grief, but with the added responsibility to raise three teenage sons and a daughter already in college. Being the good Irish Catholic she was, she immediately set her



sights on giving her kids the very best life she could. Maybe with a little bit (a lot?) of luck and some help from above, she would succeed in raising them to be productive, responsible adults.

The motorcycle in the picture is my first bike; a 1968, 350 cc., two-cycle, oil-injected, Kawasaki. I don't remember the model, but it sounded like a bag full of bees going down the street, and it left a trail of smoke that would make the Blue Angels proud. Mom was none too pleased when I came home with my pride and joy. Reluctantly she accepted my re-

solve to own my first set of wheels which gave me the personal freedom to get around, go to work, and attend classes in college on my own terms. It was a right of passage. (The fact that I had never ridden a motorcycle before and had to teach myself to ride added another dimension to my adventurous ownership, but that is a tale for another day).

Our 'portrait' was taken one summer evening approaching dinner time. Mom decided to treat the family to a rare indulgence... take-out from Steak & Shake. Back in those days there were only a few Steak & Shakes around and it was quite a thrill to cruise the local hamburger stand. Always looking for an opportunity to look cool, I offered to go retrieve our meal on my bike. I was sure there would be plenty of customers to gawk and drool with envy as I smoothly guided my iron steed into the parking lot. Always wanting to convince my mother I was a safe rider, and to exhibit self-confidence, I casually asked her, "Why don't you come along for the ride?" To my utter amazement she said, "Cool, let's go." Well, before you knew it, the helmets were on (Missouri Law and Mom's Law), my mom's tiny frame was firmly planted on the rear pillion with my Boy Scout knapsack on her back to carry home the burgers, and we were off in a cloud of blue smoke.

I'm not sure who was more nervous, me or Mom. I had ridden plenty on my own, but only a few times with a passenger. A lot was at stake besides dinner... my reputation as a good, safe, rider... but most of all not wanting to turn my brothers and sister into orphans.

We made it without incident to the restaurant. I'd like to say our entrance was glorious and graceful, but there was a bit of a line and it was start and stop. At that point I became most aware of my slow speed skills (or lack thereof) and uttered a few silent urgent requests to the powers above, "Please don't let me dump the bike with my Mom on it!"

Once in the lot, I managed to find a parking space near the front of the restaurant so the most customers possible could stare in envy at me, my Kawasaki, and, oh yeah, Mom. The helmets came off and the burgers were retrieved. As we were packing the burgers in the knapsack for the ride home, one of the patrons leaned out of their car and asked, "Is she your Mom?!" "Yeah" I answered, somewhat

sheepishly. Then they gave me one of the greatest compliments I ever received, "Cool, that's really cool!" It's hard to say who was more proud, me or Mom.

Picture #2: Fast forward 31 years to Barrington, Illinois. The year is now 2002. All Mom's kids had long since finished college and went on to have successful careers and families. Mom had done her job. That year she turned 78. The family got together to celebrate in Chicago. One afternoon we gathered at my house for a BBQ. By then, I had graduated to my Harley Road King Classic. Still wanting to be 'cool', especially in the eyes of my young niece and nephew, I offered them (with prior parental approval) a ride. After much ceremony, and a few worried looks from the parents, I gave each of them their first motorcycle ride.

When the last ride was over, we were all standing on my driveway next to my Harley chatting. I glanced over at 'Grandma' as she was listening to her grandchildren describe their recent adventure. With a bit of nostalgia tugging at me, I walked over to her and said, "You know Mom, it's been a few years. Wanna go for a spin?" She got that twinkle in her eye again, broke into a telling grin, and quickly replied, "Cool man, let's go!"

While the fashion police would certainly agree she wasn't wearing the latest in motorcycle haute couture, to the family's delight, we found her a helmet (Mom's Law is still in effect), did a safety briefing, and she climbed aboard.

We started down my street slowly. *Very* slowly. My neighbor, who saw the whole event, later remarked, he didn't think a Harley could go that slow without falling over. I kept checking with Mom to see if she was okay and told her she could call it off at any time when she had enough. She said she was fine. So we headed out onto the main roads. I fully expected to take a 5 minute ride that she could talk about with her friends and family. Little was I to know.

As we headed down the road, I kept checking with her. She was enjoying herself and wanted to keep going. Finally, after about 30 minutes, I pulled over in a park to give us a chance to stretch our legs and make sure Mom was still in 'having fun' mode. She was gung ho and wanted to carry on. She said she really liked leaning in the turns and riding on the curvy roads. Well, naturally, I had to oblige. She is Mom, after all! After a short break, we mounted up again and headed out is search of some twisties. What I originally expected to be a 5 minute tour around the neighborhood quickly turned into a leisurely cruise around the northern Illinois countryside.



We eventually made it back safe and sound. Soon my mother was exchanging 'tales of the road' with her grandchildren. For her it was an adventure. For me, our ride was a chance to take a grateful look back over my shoulder to a time when many things in my life were uncertain and at times seemed quite daunting. Through it all Mom was always there cheering me on.

A chance 'bonding' experience with my mother on a motorcycle gave me a lifelong memory. Who would have guessed that 31 years later I'd be able to share that special bond with her on the road once again.

Mom turns 84 this year and is still going strong.... she always has been, and still is, cool.

We have many mothers in the Top Cats. To you and everyone else's, I wish you --

#### **Kaution Korner by Sandra Vernon**

Sitting here on a rainy afternoon, looking for inspiration, I thought I would look back thru old ROAR issues. A couple of hours later and a great trip down memory lane.... did you know there has been a Caution Corner/Kaution Korner in the ROAR for over ten years? In the early issues, articles were written each month by Wayne Kirkpatrick and then Ric Case. The first "Road Captain/Group Riding Seminar" was held on July 31, 1999. This course later evolved into our G.R.A.S.S. class.

Most articles written for the Kaution Korner over the years have dealt with the motorcycle itself. How to "fine tune" this wonderful machine to our own personal specifications. They told us about engines that

roar, chrome that gleams, and above all, maintenance information that helps us keep our motorcycle in top performing order.

Now there is one more thing that needs to be "fine tuned" YOU!

After our long winter, we need to take stock of ourselves before we head out to the open road. Think about things that have occurred over the last months. Did you get new glasses? Did you have health issues that now require new medications? Do they affect your reaction time? Did you "break" something that is now healing but might affect your riding capabilities? We all like to think we are still 25, but reality sets in pretty quick when you climb on your bike for the

first ride of the season.

A little preparation can make that first ride much more enjoyable. Hands, there are small exercise balls you can purchase to use to strengthen your hands. Use them when you are sitting and relaxing, you will be surprised how easy that clutch and hand brake work on the next ride. Stretching is very important before, during and after your ride. There are many simple stretches you can do, begin today before riding season. Start at your head and shoulders then work down, arms, back, legs and ankles. Stretch slowly, don't jerk. Think about how you walk around your motorcycle before you ride, checking to make sure everything is in good order. Now, apply that to yourself. Ride Safe.....

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### Larry's Annual All Day Ride (Version 2008)

The weather forecast for the day was bleak. There was one front pressing in from the west and another front coming down from the north. The local and national stations called for rain in the morning and thunderstorms in the afternoon. Yuck!

When I went out to get the paper, at 5:30 in the morning, it was raining in Lake Zurich and I was getting mentally prepared for an all day drenching. But what the heck, it would still be a day of riding! After all, anytime on two wheels is time well spent!

As I traveled from my house to the Lake Zurich Costco, I noticed that the rain had stopped, but the skies looked ominous. Not a good sign, but I was still expecting a decent crowd. We usually end up with 10 to 20 riders each year, some Top Cats, some from the Chicago Region BMW club and some of my friends from various motorcycle forums that I participate in.

This year the threat of a rainy day kept most of those folks away. Seems like every year we get a little rain on this ride. Part of that has to with it being April and part of that has to do with the ride lasting about twelve hours. The constant is that there are always a bunch of folks that don't mind the weather and come out to get their first big day of the riding season in.

In year's past I've created a route that features one of my favorite Wisconsin roads, SR78. For me it's a terrific road, most of it features rustic scenery with a number of excellent sweepers and a

few stretches of exciting twisty roads. We've crafted rides that initially head west or north, using a number of different routes to get there and back. This year I wanted to head further south, so including SR78 was out of the question.

Tom Nichols volunteered to motivate me this year. He served as tail gunner for this year's ride and was along for the pre-ride earlier in the week. As many of you know, I operate two small businesses - a tax preparation and financial planning operation as well as my LRN2RYD motorcycle school. Mid April is a very hectic time for me, with the April 15th filing deadline and the start up of the motorcycle training season. I had thought about giving this ride a rest, but Tom convinced me to continue and that's when he offered his help. Tom was kind enough to say he'd enjoyed the previous all day rides and thought that this ride was an important part of the Top Cat season. If it were not for Tom spurring me on, I don't think I would have organized the ride this year.

The pre-ride was an epic tale. Tom and I met at the local McDonalds to work on the route. I had sketched out a number of options for the ride, but because of my work load this year I was unable to do the detailed planning like I usually do. This year's goal was to get down to SR100 that runs south of Peoria along the west side of the Illinois River. Last year for the first time I threw some interstate riding into the equation, allowing us to get to some nice segments of the Mississippi River Road. I intended to do the same for this year's event.

For the pre-ride we ended up going

as far south as Beardstown and then cut west until we crossed into Missouri. From there we followed the mighty Mississippi up to Burlington lowa. It rained almost the entire time that we trekked upriver. To make matters worse it was getting dark and we were a long way from the finish line. Tom and I had explored a number of small roads and we had used a lot of time trying to find just the right mix. It didn't take us to long to realize that this route was going to be too long for Saturday's ride. We headed for the barn and at ride's end we had traveled over 700 miles in about 15 hours. That proved to be more ambitious than planned and a bit bevond the original constraints of this all day ride, so it was back to the drawing board. I decided to keep the first part of the ride the same but to modify the second half.

The final route used the interstate strategy to sprint south. We took 53-355-55 to Plainfield exiting at SR126. From there we rode SR71 to Starved Rock State Park. After that the route followed a few county roads that took us closer to the swollen banks of the Illinois River. before we returned to SR71 and then ran south on SR26. The riders crossed the river over the McClugage Bridge and we arrived in Peoria around noon. The crew had a wonderful meal at the famous Hofbrau House. It was a tough call with all of the great food on the menu, but I recall prime rib sandwiches and German sausage platters with generous sides of German potato salad. There was plenty of the locally prepared blend of spicy brown mustard and horseradish sauce that immediately cleared our sinuses and added just the right tang to the meal.

The second half of the ride found us reversing our course and traveling up the other side of the Illinois River. We left the waterway in Bureau Junction taking SR26 into Princeton where we moved over to the Iowa Interstate - a two lane road labeled US6. Not sure why they call it the Iowa Interstate, but I'm sure there's a story there somewhere. We then turned north onto SR78, crossing over the Rock River in Prophetstown. The riders traveled along Moline Road before ending up on SR2 and running along the Rock River. I love this road because it's so close to the river and that complements the beautiful scenery along the way.

During the gas stop a few of us were recalling some of the earlier

all day rides. Gary Brandt has been on every one of these rides and Catalin Hategan (from the BMW club) has been on the last four. All of our memories had some rain in them. Gary remembered a ride a few years back where a good portion of the riders stopped after only a few miles when the rain started and decided they were getting too wet. Thirty minutes later the skies cleared up and we had perfect weather the rest of the day. Catalin remembered the ride three years ago when the rain seldom stopped and that a good portion of the 500 mile ride was in heavy rain. The weather Gods smiled on us this year. The clouds looked bad most of the day, but we were never rained on. In fact at every gas stop we were greeted with sunny skies

and we were able to bask in the sunlight and warm our wind chilled bones.

We turned back east outside of Rockford returning on US20 and SR176. John LaMonica was our fifth rider. As the ride wound down, one rider at a time peeled off and headed to the warmth of their own home. It turned out that John was the last man riding at day's end. We covered 430 miles and the ride lasted ten and a half hours. Not bad for an All Day Ride. Good roads, good friends, good eats and plenty of miles – it doesn't get any better than this! The meeting started at 7:33pm at Gino's East in Lake Zurich.

A motion was passed and seconded to accept the March board meeting minutes.

Gary announced that Joe Fiedler, president of JerseyPines Cruisers, was thankful for being received and welcomed as a guest at the recent April general meeting. He wants to work more with area clubs such as the Top Cats. Gary extended an open invitation to Joe to have his members attend G.R.A.S.S. classes as well as possibly some ride sharing

The last general meeting was crisp, organized and went well. Congratulations to Tom Malia for the Navigation Aides presentation. Tom did a good job, the presentation was well received and a lot of positive response was generated.

The 2008 budget was discussed with details about final membership receipts. A consensus was met to email soon a request for form of repayment or donation to the club for a \$5 refund due for people who came to the Tommy Guns dinner in March.

We need to add a third authorized signee for Top Cats checks. Currently our president and treasurer are authorized. A motion was

passed and accepted to authorize the Secretary. An initial proposal to add the Vice President was not accepted due to distance and availability.

Tom Nichols gave the Board an update on developments and preparations for the Ride for Dreams. The ride will follow last years outline. The ride is about 1-1/2 hours and 60 miles long. We will have a cash raffle. Tom has gotten a sponsor to make a corporate donation that will cover the costs for the continental breakfast and lunch.

Tom urged the Board to start the process for a committee chair earlier next year. This would give more time to plan and help with the ride being more effective. The Board needs to search for and recruit a candidate now to chair next year's charity ride committee. A suggestion was made to search for a deputy or co-chair for this year's ride to assist in grooming a candidate for next year. Gary asked all board members to assist with one tasks to support the ride and Tom.

Gary was looking for board volunteers to talk about the ride in May and June's general meetings. Wayne volunteered for May and Bob in June. Something special will be developed for July's meeting.

The Ride for Dreams brochures, tickets and registration forms should all be available by May's general meeting. Registration forms will also be emailed to members. A registration cost was agreed to for \$25 per bike and

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\$15 for extra rider. No Pre-ride registration discount will be offered. A \$20 discount per club member was approved. The discount was discussed as an early sign up incentive. An 11x17" size poster was okayed. Other sponsor's such as Allstate are being sought. Ideas and other donations were discussed such as raffle sponsors for flat screen TV's, or dealers giving a donation for bike maintenance. The Ride for Dreams is primarily a great event and should be promoted that way too.

The Posse meeting between local area club representatives was held on April 5<sup>th</sup>. Mike attend substituting for Gary. He reported that the meeting was very useful in co-coordinating our charity rides between local clubs to avoid interference and scheduling duplications. George Barrington, an American Motorcyclist Association representative attended. Also attending for the first time was JerseyPines Cruisers. Some discussion ensued on AMA sanctioning of events and whether any benefits exists for that. Mike also told of how he was approached at the meeting by a father whose son is in NISRA and was thanked for the club's donations and support.


