PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Greetings Top Cats!

It is good to know that our outrage, as well as that of the motorcycle community, concerning the circumstances and initially light charge against Lora Hunt for the killing of Anita Zaffke did not go unheard. As reported to us by Joe Rominski and Wayne Kirkpatrick at our last board meeting, the Lake County State's Attorneys office has been conducting an in depth investigation of the circumstances. Fortunately, one of the senior attorneys heading up the investigation is very knowledgeable about motorcycles and riding. To avoid possible double jeopardy issues the Prosecutor has dropped the initial charge leveled against Ms. Hunt while this proceeds. We will keep you informed of the progress of the case at the next membership meeting and by email, if necessary. Keep in mind that vigorous prosecution and new legislation does not necessarily make the world a better place for bikers; we must be every cautious and vigilant of what is going around us and be ready to avoid or mitigate bad circumstances.

For instance, on Sunday evening I received an email from the Director of Lake Shore HOG directed to all Chapter Road Captains about the ride they conducted that day. They had not one, but two, separate incidents of bikers in their own group slamming into others in front of them. Those in front had stopped at stop signs instead of following the pack through the intersection. On a bike you cannot assume what the person in front of you is going to do. Be ready at all times for anything that can happen.

On a happier note, please, please, please help us prepare; sell raffle tickets; get ready for and participate in our Ride for Dreams that is on July 26th. We need your help. The Charity Ride Committee has spent lots of time and energy on this, and we need all of our members to participate. Top Cats, this is our opportunity to help our community and the disabled children who are members of NISRA. See you at the next meeting. In the meantime, RIDE ON!



BEATING THE SUMMER HEAT

Heat Stroke and De-hydration can kill you, so don't let it happen to you! 100+ degree days are common in August for Wisconsin, Minnesota, South Dakota, Wyoming, etc. So take a few simple precautions to protect yourself and those riding with you - and that will be "cool".....

A few basics:

When dressing, think LIGHT, COVERED and WET. Also, drink lots of water.

Dress in LIGHT colored clothes as they reflect the heat. Black leather may look cool, but it isn't! Dark colors absorb the heat.

Stay COVERED for sun protection and heat protection, especially if the temp is higher than 98.6 degrees. Do you get it...??? 98.6 degrees - that's the average body temp. So, if the outside air is hotter than that, you want to avoid having 98.7+ degree air blowing over your skin. The best hot weather riding wear for sun and heat protection would be a white long sleeve shirt, and a white or silver helmet. For added protection from a fall down, a light colored armored breathable riding jacket will be cooler than a black leather jacket.

Keep WET....stay wet around the neck, head and chest. Do you all understand the principle of "air conditioning" and the technology behind it? Simply put, air conditioning is the result of moisture evaporation. When water or moisture evaporates, it cools. God made our bodies with built in air conditioning systems. When we sweat, that causes body moisture to evaporate, which gives a cooling effect. We bikers want to help that process along on a hot day, by wearing something wet around our necks, on our heads. And for the chest, you can wear a wet t-shirt. Wet neck wraps, when being hit by wind, cool the neck and the main artery and veins between the heart and brain. Buy an absorbent neck wrap or simply tie a big handkerchief around your neck and pour water on it every hour. I recommend you wear a

light colored helmet for many reasons, but if you're like me and don't do what you know you should do 100% of the time, at least put something wet on your head. I have a ROBO hat, a denim hat, when wet, at 60 mph, it turns my head into an ice cube...the 60 mph wind accelerates the evaporation process of the wet hat, and cools very quickly. This really does work well in 100 degrees plus weather.

Water, water, and more water along with special beverages that replace the salts and minerals in your body all can make a difference. At every rest/gas stop, drink at least a few pints of water. Carry water on your bike in an easily accessible place - which means, it isn't locked in your tour pack. ALCOHOL and CAFFEINE will dehydrate you very quickly. Did you ever wonder why, after a night out painting the town red, you wake up in the middle of the night thirsty? It's because of all the ALCOHOL you drank, and in the process of elimination, vital liquids are also lost. I know you are all adults and over 21, but for many reasons, I would appreciate that no alcohol be consumed during the riding day on my ride. Once the bikes are parked for the night, let the fun begin. Caffeine and coffee also dehydrate, so drink coffee in moderation if you must have a little jolt to get your body in motion in the morning.


Finally, lots of hi-tech micro fiber clothing is coming on the market which wicks the moisture from your body in the heat. It is very breathable for hot weather and works by insulating and keeping you warm in the cold. Go to your outdoor camping or outfitter store, or to a bicycle shop and check out the new socks, underwear and shirts. As you build your wardrobe of riding gear...think multi-purpose and all-weather. This new micro-fiber stuff also can be hand washed in your sink, and will dry by morning.

OK, boys and girls, are we all 'cool' with this? It also helps to pray for a 70 degree day!

Saturday May 9th 8:00 am. It is 52 Here is proof that even a Hog can be “GREEN”. An all electric motorcycle and to top it off, an all electric Harley-Davidson! Yes, you read that right, Harley-Davidson is going green!

Well, not exactly, but close. Carl [Vogel](#), an inventor-entrepreneur and a Harley enthusiast, has modified a Harley-Davidson chassis so that it houses 560 pounds of lead-acid batteries and a 79 hp electric motor that can achieve 85 mph. The bike is less powerful than a stock Harley and can travel about 60 miles, at 55 mph, on a single charge. The electric bike can be plugged into an electrical wall outlet and recharged in three hours. Vogel has been manufacturing the electric motorcycles since 2007 and will sell them for a price tag between \$29,000 and

\$40,000.

MOTORCYCLE SUNGLASSES

Anyone who rides a motorcycle knows the importance of a good pair of motorcycle sunglasses. You need to have protection for your eyes from the glare of the sun, but more importantly you need exceptional motorcycle sunglasses so that you can see where you are going as well as the traffic in front of you.

There are certain features that make one style of sunglasses the best motorcycle sunglasses. Of course, the best style in motorcycle sun glasses is



really up to the individual, but there are common features you should look for. When you want the best in motorcycle

sunglasses, you have to look for those with shatter-proof lenses. When you ride a motorcycle, the likelihood of small bits of debris hitting you in the face is very high. Therefore you need sunglasses that are hard to break.

Most of the lenses in motorcycle sunglasses are made of polycarbonate, which makes them stronger than ordinary lenses. You also need the best motorcycle sunglasses with a UV 400 filter to protect your eyesight. Another important feature to look for in motorcycle sun glasses is that they provide you with the ultimate protection from the wind. These sun glasses really need to be a snug fit so that nothing can in around the glasses.

If you look at photos of motorcycle sunglasses, you will see they are smaller than the usual sunglasses.

This is because they need to fit tight on the nose and around the eyes. Because of this necessary feature, motorcycle sun



glasses need to be lightweight. The best motorcycle sunglasses are made of nylon and metal for a better

fit and comfort. However, some motorcycle riders prefer to have all metal frames in their sun glasses because they know they are durable.

When choosing motorcycle sunglasses, you also need a vented frame. Because the sunglasses are tight to your face, they will fog up if there are no vents to let air circulate. To make the sun glasses as comfortable as possible while you're riding a motorcycle some designers have added foam on the ear pieces and foam padding around the frame. Although some riders wear helmets with tinted face masks, during the hot, sunny days of the summer you want to feel the warm wind on your face. The motorcycle sun glasses make the thrill of the ride that much more enjoyable.

A NEW TOY FOR YOU MOTORCYCLE ENTHUSIASTS



The Gunbus 410 cubic inch V-Twin motorcycle is complete. The monster engine placed in a motorcycle frame of comparable size looked impossible and many who saw the photos were skeptical of the bike ever being finished, but I guess Clemens F. Leonhardt is one of those persistent guys who ignores the naysayers and keeps at his work.



The fuel-injected, 45 degree 6728 cc/410 cubic inch V-Twin runs through a 3 speed transmission with reverse and actually looks pretty good in its finished state. In fact, everything looks good! It puts out 523 foot pounds of torque. Seat height is 31.5 inches and overall length is 136 inches.

It is a little heavy at 1433 pounds so high speed corner carving might be an issue and there aren't any photos of the big bike on the road, so I guess we'll have to wait for the road test, that is if someone can actually road test this monster.

This is actually going to go into limited series production and a sidecar will be available as well, which might help with balance when waiting at a light.

I don't even want to think about a driveway tip over.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING MINUTES

JUNE 9, 2009

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 at Gino's East in Lake Zurich.

2010 Elections; Gary Brandt, (Past President and Election Committee Chair)

Gary presented to the board that the committee had created an election process and has issued the recommendations for the next year's club officers to our President, Carl Marcyan who has approved both. Per our club by-laws, all incumbent board members, less one, are eligible to serve again in their existing positions for another year. Greg Smith is ineligible to serve again since he has reached the limit of two consecutive years served as the club's Activity Director. All incumbents have until August 15th to respond to Gary with their intents for serving next year.

Updates on the Laura Hunt Case; Wayne Kirkpatrick, (Director)

Joe Rominski reported to the board that the original charges for failure to yield to avoid an accident have been dismissed. The prosecutor's decided this was the best course of action while reviewing the case to avoid "double jeopardy" to pursue a greater charge such as reckless homicide. The prosecutor assigned to this case is expected to be sensitive to motorcyclists and motorcycling issues in general. He has been a motorcyclist for 35 years and owns 7 bikes.

Ride For Dreams/status and progress; Eileen Perry (Director)

Eileen is filling in for Joan while she is on vacation. Generally things are going well. Funds are being received for registration. Joan did drop by to hand off additional ride registrations and funds. The scooter event displays for ticket sales has started. The scooter was displayed at Buffo's in Highwood on May 30th with \$125

of tickets sold. The June events are; Barrington Cruiser Nite on June 11th, Volo Auto Museum for the Shelby Mustang Car Show on June 14th and Buffo's Cruiser Night on June 27th. Richmond Cruiser Night for June 12th was cancelled. *Raffle ticket sales will be crucial for success and providing the greatest donations possible to NISRA.*

Membership; Eileen Perry (Director)

No new member applications were submitted. Doug Jackson from Woodstock Harley is interested. Wayne has talked with him. Steve Hammer is riding with the club to Sturgis as a guest and may apply.

ROAR/Website Updates; Dennis Dougherty (Director)

The ROAR changes are an improvement. Those changes were a network of associate editors by subject, a new layout including margined article content list and upcoming events, more pictures as well as others. Mary Walters, as editor and the new system of associate editors, are getting articles submitted and is going well. The board has not received the new list of article requests from Mary. Mary has been gone on vacation but is returning and should be emailing at the end of the week.

The website needs a professional contractor to clean it up. The site was created with a lot of effort by Brian Rainey and has served okay but takes extra work to manage due to problems with the platform software. Dennis presented 3 options for addressing the needs of the website.

1. *Leave the website alone.* The site platform software is a mess now. This is due to bad code and garbage in the software when the site was launched. Links within the site are faulty and flawed. This creates a lot of extra work to manage and maintain the clubs information. This needs to be fixed because it is only a matter of time before it becomes a bigger issue.

2. *Update the Joomla software platform.* This option will create a more stable platform with the same functionality that exists now. A contractor could do this in phases so progress can be approved by the club stage by stage. This option is estimated to cost \$1,500 for the first phase.

3. *Start over and create a new website with a different platform.* This is the highest costing option and is more difficult to estimate depending on what the club wants. This could include all types of “bells and whistles” and enhanced website capabilities.

Carl requested Dennis provide the board information on the chosen designer/developer before any final commitments are made. In addition, Carl suggested Dennis contact John Sweeney for potential website support ideas.

Speakers, Products; Mike Bradbury (Vice President)

Speakers: Mike is looking for ideas for new speakers. Gina Woods from Open Road Radio was suggested by the board. Mike will contact and invite to her to speak at the next general meeting.

Products: 31 total polo shirts were ordered from the membership. They are a nice quality and are black with white or yellow embroidered club patch logos. They have been purchased and should be done in a couple of days. Member pick up with collection of \$25 per shirt will be at the next general meeting and Mike will send an emailed announcement beforehand to the membership.

Mike has not ordered flags yet but will do so soon.

Financial Report: Tom Nichols (Treasurer)

A balance sheet and draft budget were presented to the board. Time was short and the matter was deferred for more discussion at the next board meeting.

Awards: Wayne Kirkpatrick (Director)

Wayne and the Awards Committee are going to present some ideas for new awards. Maybe a “Year” pin presented yearly showing the member’s # of years in the club. Wayne will report back soon.

The meeting adjourned at 8:54.
