So, do you get intimidated with gravel, or curse at the road captain because of road construction, or are afraid to venture off the pavement to those quaint hide-a-ways you've only read about in magazines?

We'll, here are a few tips to help you overcome these issues, build your self confidence as a rider, and take you places you've only dreamed about... There's a whole new world out there once you leave the pavement, or, if you never want to leave the pavement but the road captain forces you to traverse a mile or ten of road construction and gravel, this should help.

1. Empty your intestines before you leave if gravel concerns you.

2. Turn off your ABS, if your bike is so equipped, before entering long stretches of gravel or dirt. On some bikes, ABS (anti-lock brake systems) are integrated with both the front and rear brake. In other words, when you active EITHER the front or the rear, you actually get braking on BOTH. Hummm...you don't want that front brake locking up when you hit only the rear brake do you? NO...in the dirt, most of your braking should be done with the rear brake.

3. STAND UP on the pegs. (If you can. It's hard if not impossible, on most Harleys due to the pegs positioned as front bumpers) but if you can, STAND UP. This lowers your center of gravity from the seat to the pegs, and enables greater balance control by having the ability to move your weight around from right side to left side, and front to rear. Hard to do from the seat, comes instinctively when on the pegs. Whether you're standing on the pegs on your BMW, or sitting on your throne with your feet stuck out front on your HD, "squeeze" the tank with your knees. This also improves balance and centering weight.

4. RELAX on the handle bars, let them "free flow" and let the front tire follow the terrain, ruts and contour of the road. Don't fight the bars or natural tracking of the bike...stay loose on the handle bars and ride it out.

5. KNOW YOUR LIMITS...self explanatory. Adjust speed accordingly, and remember you can always turn around and paddle out with your feet. Be careful, however, of hitting the rear passenger pegs when you "Paddle" with your feet down.

6. LOOK UP and LOOK AHEAD. You have all heard about "target fixation"....you will go where you are looking. If you are looking at the rut or stone right in front of you, you will hit it. If you are looking up ahead and down the road, your God given sub-conscious reflexes and coordination skills will get you there...get you exactly to where you are looking.

7. Balance and Body Position. Unlike being on a paved race track, in the dirt or gravel, your weight should be on the OUTSIDE of a turn...shift weight by standing on or putting pressure on the right or left foot peg, right or left side of the seat if on a HD, and keep weight OFF the handlebars. Remember, light and loose on those bars. Going UP HILL...move weight to the front, going DOWN HILL move weight to the rear.

OK...saddle up and find a gravel road and practice. You'll now LOVE the gravel! You'll then sell your "styling cruiser" and go out and buy a dual sport adventure touring bike.

So You Want to be an Iron Butt Rider... By Larry Scalzitti

Long distance riding is something that you either get or don't. It's hard to explain the satisfaction that one gets from accomplishing a ride that others think is just too hard to try. I believe that this compulsion that some of us have is really an outgrowth of being task driven individuals.

Distance is just a matter of perspective. Before I ever thought about riding far on a motorcycle I rode far on a bicycle. When I was in graduate school in the late 80s we could only afford one car, so guess who used a bicycle for his daily transportation. One day a friend of mine suggested that I join him on a 12 mile bike ride. I thought he was a lunatic – 12 miles on a bicycle – who in their right mind would do that for fun. Well, he eventually wore me down and 12 miles really wasn't that far. A few years later we found ourselves stationed on the tiny island of Guam. It was here that I really got into bicycle riding. Then we moved to Annapolis, Maryland and I discovered the Rails to Trails path between Baltimore and Annapolis. I really fell in love with long distance riding on those long winding trails and side roads. My normal day soon featured a 30 to 50 mile bike ride. Eventually I was completing "century" rides – 100 miles - and beginning to do multiple day long rides, usually as part of a fund raising effort for charitable organizations. I couldn't get enough and then we moved back to Chicago and it wasn't as easy to ride take a look at this web page. Be warned that you may anymore.

I soon fell in with motorcycling and it didn't take long for me to switch from sailing the seven seas to riding down a number of long lonesome highways. I ran into some folks on the road on my first trip to Alaska. I had been routinely riding 400 to 600 miles a day and thought nothing of it. Every mile was a good mile and I couldn't get enough. I would get up and ride until it got dark or I got tired and I couldn't wait to get on the bike the next day. The two guys that I met had just finished their first 1000 mile day and told me all about a group called the Iron Butt Association. I didn't know it then, but they hooked me right there and then.



To become a member of the Iron Butt Association (IBA) you must complete an entry level ride called the SaddleSore 1000. To read about the history of this ride and learn about the rules for the ride visit this web page. http://www.ironbutt.com/ridecerts/ getdocument.cfm?DocID=1

In reality many of the Iron Butt rides are doable by any motorcyclist if you have the right mindset and take the time to prepare both your bike and yourself for the ride. There are a number of TopCats that have completed Iron Butt rides. Some documented their accomplishments others have not. If you want to see all of the different rides that are certified by the IBA, find a ride that you feel you MUST ride. <u>http://</u> www.ironbutt.com/ridecerts/

I'm getting ready to plan a few long distance rides for the remainder of this year. If you have always wanted to try an Iron Butt Ride, let me know. My intentions are to lead an Illinois 1000 and then either a Lake Superior 1000 or a Lower Great Lakes 1000. Target date for the first ride is July, so let me know soon. I want all potential riders to be included in the planning and the preparation phases of the ride. The more effort you put into this part of the ride the more likely you'll be successful on your first attempt.

You could also look at the radar map of area to try and avoid driving in severe conditions.
