

THINGS YOU SHOULD DO BEFORE THAT CROSS-COUNTRY TRIP... To have a safer ride!

Here are some pointers that I have learned over the last couple years of long distance motorcycle trips.


I have been riding since I was 14 years old, but have just recently started long distance rides. I am finding out that this is a whole new experience! Being prepared IS THE difference between a good trip and a bad trip

The first step is to have your routes prepared in advance, this is a lot easier today with tools like google and the internet to help plan. On these kind of rides, you cannot always pre-ride to prepare, so it is important to study and develop alternate routes for whatever you may encounter. The possibilities for challenges include road closures, geographical changes and weather. The more you know about the roads in the area you will be traveling, the easier it will be to make adjustments if needed.

First and Foremost make sure your ride is worthy of the trip! You wouldn’t want to ride a 350 Honda on a 3,000 mile trip (at lease I wouldn’t). Take the time to be comfortable on the bike that you will be riding. And know local dealers or mechanics that you can contact... just in case.

Also, have your logging booked ahead and confirm reservations. You don’t want to end up looking for a place after a long and challenging day. Being able to CRASH on a comfy bed is a great way to end a day! And a good way to ensure a safe ride for the next day too!

Never assume the weather forecast will be what you are hearing in the morning. (even the weather man is wrong sometimes) Depending on where you are and at what elevation you are traveling, weather can change in a blink of the eye.

And yes, I have found that when dealing with elevation changes, there's a big difference between 1,000 ft and 10,000ft . If you are traveling out west, you should also be prepared for radical temperature changes. In traveling a few hundred miles, you may encounter a change from 110 Degrees to 30 degrees. Elevation can create rain, hail and snow as storm fronts hit the sides of the mountains. There's nothing worse than being cold and wet driving thru the mountains. In the picture on the previous page, the change came in a matter of inches. We came around a curve where the clouds were hitting the hillside and the moisture was dropping quickly. The pavement went from wet to inches of hail in just a few feet. You really have to pack wisely and choose your clothing as well as your roads... because you must always be prepared to layer up or down depending on the weather, and always be ready to protect everything on your bike from getting wet too.

Always fill up at every stop and carry octane booster if your bike requires. Riding thru rural areas gas station can be a challenge. Stations are few and far between and sometimes they just are not open .



Be reasonable on how many miles a day you want to ride. Sometime you have to stick it out because there just nothing or nowhere to stop and you don't have a choice, but planning ahead will give you the opportunity to 'gear up' mentally for what will be a LONG day.

Eating on the road, can also be a challenge. This is another area to pack wisely. I have found ,for me at least, that light snacks and hydration during stops are in very important. Having a big meal made me tired and drowsy in the middle of the day, and is not a safe way to ride while trying to go that last 175miles. Save the big meal for after the days ride and always carry water.

Anything can happen from rock slides to buffalo traffic, so be prepared for and everything! Riding on a trip like this is a mental game and you have stay alert and ready for all of the challenges that come along. It requires you to be innovative at times and constantly adjust your expectations.

Let somebody know your ride plan and the stops you are making. The more others know, the easier it will be for them to help you if you find it necessary to get support!

Riding gear, is a topic worth repeating here. I have found that this is a very important part of a safe ride, so spend a little extra in this area. It seems that you get what you pay for, and again ,there nothing worse than being cold or wet , because this for sure can ruin your ride!

Finally, take the time to look your bike over every morning,. Checking the simple stuff—air pressure, oil level, loose or missing fasteners takes a little time, BUT... it can save you from big trouble. Have AMA road service card or some sort of motor club card to help in the event of a breakdown

Plan a day just to relax or just a morning ride to a simple destination in the middle of your travels will make a big difference. It will make this a vacation and not an endurance ride! These trips may not always turn out perfectly -weather will not always be sunny, roads will not always be well paved, wind might not be at your back, But those are the things that STORIES are made of! Being prepared, though, will help you to make things go easier.... And SAFER! Happy Trails!

Harley-Davidson Continues Fight Against Counterfeiters



The complaint was filed at the US District Court for the Northern District of Illinois on Friday, August 11. It accused the defendants, named as an “interrelated group of counterfeiters”, of running online stores on a range of platforms and marketing the sites on social media.

The group was accused of selling motorcycle parts, apparel, jewelry and other goods “using counterfeit versions of Harley-Davidson’s federally registered trademarks”.

“Defendants facilitate sales by designing the defendant internet stores so that they appear to unknowing consumers to be authorized online retailers, outlet stores, or wholesalers,” it said in the claim.

It added: “The unauthorized use of the Harley-Davidson trademark is likely to cause and has caused confusion, mistake and deception among consumers and is irreparably harming Harley-Davidson.”

Harley-Davidson is seeking injunctive relief, a transfer of infringing domain names, a transfer of profits derived from the infringing products, \$2 million for

“each and every use of the ‘Harley-Davidson’ trademarks”, and attorneys’ fees.

In May, it obtained an injunction and was awarded damages against another group of counterfeiters also running an online store.

The order stated that “all monies currently restrained in defaulting defendants’ financial accounts, including monies held by PayPal, are hereby released to Harley-Davidson as partial payment”.

Bronze Star Recipient Surprised With Gift of New Harley-Davidson Motorcycle at Sturgis

At the Sturgis Motorcycle Rally on “Military Appreciation Day,” Bronze Star recipient, Charles Swank,



was honored with a new Harley-Davidson powered by a Milwaukee-Eight Engine.

The surprise moment was part of MISSION: “THANK YOU” – a cross-country tour led by Scoot-in’ America’s Adam Sandoval to celebrate the men and women who dedicated their lives to protecting our freedom.

Enlisting in the Army on Sept 11, 2001, Charles was deployed to Iraq in 2003 as an infantryman with the 82nd Airborne and Afghanistan in 2005. He earned a Bronze Star for helping a wounded comrade during a firefight. A father of five, his service ended in 2006, but he serves his community as a firefighter in Butler, Ohio.

Harley-Davidson Launches Global Riding Campaign

Harley-Davidson has launched a new brand platform, “All for Freedom, Freedom for All,” to celebrate the company’s legacy and “the pursuit of freedom that unites all.”

H-D dealership owner adds second location

George C. Chaconas of Performance Brokerage Services announced the sale of Waterkotte Harley-Davidson in Mount Vernon, Illinois, from the Waterkotte family to Rodney Cabaness. Cabaness owns and operates Black Diamond Harley-Davidson in Marion, Illinois, only 40 miles away from Waterkotte Harley-Davidson.



Waterkotte H-D was once Dale’s Harley-Davidson. Gary Surdyke acquired Dale’s H-D from Dale Walksler in 2000. For nearly 10 years, the dealership generated nearly \$20 million in sales annually. However, in 2008 the store experienced a decline with the failing economy. Gary Surdyke and wife Linda Surdyke have 10 children, all of whom grew up in the Harley-Davidson business. As an attempt to pass the business onto their children, Surdyke offered the dealership to his daughter Rebecca and her husband Matt Waterkotte, who changed the name to Waterkotte Harley-Davidson in 2014.

Waterkotte Harley-Davidson will operate under its new name Roadhouse Harley-Davidson and will remain at its current location at 205 North 44th St. in Mount Vernon, Illinois.

Between the standing room only Class of 2017 Hall of Fame induction ceremony, the Pappy Hoel Speed Classic races and the brand new block party with bands going live at five on the Glencoe Stage every day, the 77th Sturgis Rally was rocking for the entire rally week! Better weather and a full schedule of events helped bump up attendance to more than 376,000 people this year.

“Come for the races, stay for the entertainment,” said

Myrick Robbins, executive director for the Sturgis Museum & Hall Of Fame. Appropriately things kicked off at the very same historic dirt track where it all began back in 1938. The Pappy Hoel Speed Classic roared into the Meade County Fairgrounds in downtown Sturgis on August 3-5.

“We were twisting the throttle to the stops with the Speed Classic, the inaugural Block Party co-hosted by our friends from Monster Energy and the annual Hall Of Fame ceremonies,” said Robbins. “But that is what



the Sturgis Rally is all about. Founder J.C. ‘Pappy’ Hoel started with a race and a week-long spectacle just sort of evolved from there.”



Also evolving was the Sturgis Block Party. For the first time this year, merchants on the newly revitalized Main Street teamed up with the Museum and Monster Energy to host a week-long event right in the heart of downtown. “Motorcycles, music and more... it was rocking,” said Robbins.

However, the Hall Of Fame Induction Ceremony presented by Strider Sports was definitely the highlight of the week. John Paul DeJoria, philanthropist co-founder of Paul Mitchell hair products and Patrón Spirits (as well a Hall of Famer himself) emceed

"I'd like to give you a little secret to building something," said the man who went from being homeless to becoming a billionaire. "However you participate, whether it is as a rider, builder, or any way you participate in this industry, make sure the quality of what you personally do or the quality of the product you produce or the quality of the words you say are the finest quality in the world."

When DeJoria started Patrón in 1989 it was the quality that made the difference. "Quality reaps longevity. Quality continuously keeps something going... and it is the quality of these people that will keep the industry and the Museum going."

"The Sturgis Motorcycle Museum & Hall of Fame recognizes individuals or groups who have made a long-term, positive impact on the motorcycle community," added Robbins. "We honor our Hall of Fame members by telling their stories and history, showcasing their contributions and accomplishments. In doing this, we hope to inspire our visitors and the riding community."

The class of 2017 may have been the most influential and inspirational yet. From Lifetime Achievement honoree William G. Davidson to the

Pappy Hoel Award winner Rod Woodruff, founder of The Buffalo Chip, the Lodge at Deadwood in Deadwood, South Dakota, was packed with the best and brightest in the motorcycle industry. Colleen Barnett-Taylor and Mike Taylor, Cory Ness, Mark Shadley, Jim Thiessen and Terry Vance comprised this year's inductees.

"I get excited every year at Sturgis... I jump up and down a lot and I yell and scream and I blew out my voice," said Lifetime Achievement honoree Willie G. after being introduced by his son and current director of the Harley Davidson Museum, Bill Davidson. "I would like to thank the Sturgis Hall of Fame for honoring me and I will always remember a day like today."

Blown out voice or not, Willie rallied to conclude the ceremony shouting a message near and dear to all the honorees, past and present:

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
