KAUTION KORNER Free Time Now...and Fun time Later...

It is February. After the Super Bowl is over, you might have a little time on your hands. Think about the days that are coming when the Hockey and Basketball all-star games are over. Your thoughts begin to wander and you now find yourself looking forward to that first warm day so you can riding that beautiful motorcycle of yours.

Will you be ready? Will you have everything set to go? Now might be the perfect time to inspect your riding gear to make sure you are completely ready. Here are some tips to begin that process and get you started. Be wary, though, because once you start... One thing can lead to another! Have a budget in mind and prioritize your list.

Inspect your helmet (from last month's KK) to see the manufactures' production date. If it exceeds five years old, then you might consider replacing it.

Check your leathers. Give them a good coat of

leather dressing. Check your gloves for cracks, stitching to see if it is coming apart. If yes, fix or replace.





Check your footwear. Are the soles thin? Are they cracking? If yes, again, fix or replace.

Do you have any heated gear? Check the connections. Have you added heated gear? Make sure your electrical system will have enough capacity to handle it.



So, after you have your list 'needs', start shopping now while there is some time. Also, there are lots of good

deals this time of year so if any of the above items need replacing it's a good time to negotiate and make purchases. If you do this now, you may be able to check more off of your list than if you wait for bike season when prices are not as flexible...

Act now... So when that first warm day arrives, you will be ready!

It is February and a great time to think about registering for an advanced/ skilled/experienced rider class. As you begin to think about what class you want to enroll in, there are a few things to consider.

First let's review the required clothing, certifications, and materials that are a part of all classes.

- ✦ A Helmet minimum ½ helmet.
- + Eye protection (either glasses or a windscreen that is higher than your eyes in a normal seated position),
- + Full fingered gloves,
- + Long sleeves or a jacket,
- + Long sturdy pants,
- + Sturdy over the ankle footwear.
- + You must posses a valid drivers license with an "M" Motorcycle class endorsement,
- + Current motorcycle registration,
- + Valid and verifiable insurance coverage And Finally....
- + Your motorcycle must pass a safety inspection that includes but is not limited to: adequate tire tread with proper tire inflation, all lights functioning, working horn, and adequate brakes pads.

Here are some of the local choices that you can investigate as you work on improving your skills:

- ♦ T. O. P. S. Offered by David Struwing <u>630 677-2433</u> <u>david@topsmotorcycle.com</u>.
- Harley-Davidson Riding Academy's Skilled Rider Class usually offered on the Saturday before Easter and the Saturday before Mothers' Day, check with your favorite H-D dealership.
- State local regional Motorcycle Safety Programs (NIU and Cook County regions) again usually offered on the Saturday before Easter and the Saturday before mothers' day.

Check their web pages for locations and availability and also to register.

These classes offer you an excellent opportunity to re-establish, brush-up, and practice your riding skills and possibly break any bad habits you may have.. It's a great way to make sure that you and your fellow Top Cats will have a safe riding season.

Harley recalls 2012 DynaSoftail models

Harley-Davidson is recalling just over 19,000 Dyna and Softail motorcycles from the 2012 model year because the threads for the brake line banjo bolt in the front brake master cylinder may corrode. If the threads corrode, a sudden loss of brake fluid could result, causing a loss of the front brakes.



Models affected are the 2012 FXST103, FLSTC, FLSTC103, FLSTF, FLSTF103, FXDL, FXDWG, FXDWG103,

FXDC, FXDB, FLSTN, FLSTN103, FLSTC103 Shrine, FLSTFB, FLSTFB103, FXS, FXS103, FLS, be registered under one of two classes: over 50cc and FLS103, FLD, FLD103, and FXDF and FXDF103 50cc and under. Operators of both types of vehicles motorcycles manufactured from Aug. 22, 2011, must show proof of ownership and wear helmets if through Feb. 24, 2012, for the United States and some they are under 18 years of age. The NHTSA recall number is 14V794000.

Dealers will flush and inspect the front brake master cylinder and, if necessary, replace the master cylinder. The recall began Jan. 14.

"We have voluntarily declared this a defect related to motor vehicle safety (Campaign 0163 for the Softail model and Dyna model motorcycles and 0164 for the FXDF/FXDF103 model motorcycles) to allow us to formally recall all affected motorcycles.

"Based on warranty information, the prediction for motorcycles requiring master cylinder replacements is extremely low,"

Dealers are permitted to sell but must not deliver any of the affected motorcycles until the remedy is complete, the OEM added.

New laws: TX mandates passenger footrests, IN governs mopeds and more

A new year means new regulations, particularly at the state level. The most notable of the regulations taking effect on Jan. 1 are from Texas, Indiana, Alaska, Illinois, Michigan, New Hampshire, Pennsylvania, and Utah.

TEXAS - House Bill 3838, otherwise known as Malorie's Law, went into effect Jan. 1, requiring motorcycles that are designed for carrying more than one person to be equipped with passenger footrests and handholds. Texas already prohibits passengers on motorcycles that are not designed to carry more than one person.

INDIANA - Motorized cycles and mopeds must now vehicles are required to carry liability insurance and must have a valid driver's license with motorcycle endorsement. Riders of 50cc-and-under vehicles must be 15 years of age or older and have a valid Indiana state ID card with a motor driven cycle Class B endorsement, learner's permit or driver's license.

MICHIGAN - The state closed a loophole that enabled motorcyclists to buy a temporary riding permit multiple times (for example, each riding season) without taking the safety or skills tests required for full endorsement. Applicants are now limited to two permits within a 10-year period. In a separate action, the state lowered the blood alcohol limit to 0.08 for ATV, snowmobile and watercraft operators from a previous 0.10 BAC.

NEW HAMPSHIRE - Allows non-residents to apply for temporary non-resident OHV registrations for 10 consecutive day periods during May through October.

PENNSYLVANIA - State's Department of Transportation now can authorize third parties to administer the skills test portion of motor vehicle licensing exams.

UTAH - Increased the tax credit for the original purchase of a new qualifying electric vehicle registered in the state to be either \$1,500 or 35 percent of purchase price.

NHTSA: Motorcycle injury, fatality

Motorcycle fatalities dropped 6.4 percent in 2013, according to a report issued in mid-December by NHTSA.

"This was the first decrease in motorcyclist fatalities since 2009 [and] the only other decrease since 1997," NHTSA reported.



Established Thank the aging rider population: more than half of new regulations for service the decline was attributed to a drop in older rider facontracts, including new provider requirements, and talities. There were 190 fewer fatalities in the 50-to-69-year age group in 2013 than there were in 2012, NHTSA noted.

> According to NHTSA's Fatality Analysis Reporting The group of states without universal helmet laws reported 11 times as many unhelmeted motorcyclist fatalities than states with such laws: 1,704 vs. 150, respectively, the agency noted.

> Motorcycle-related deaths accounted for 14.3 percent of all traffic deaths in 2013, down from 14.8 percent in 2012. But it's still higher than it was back in 2003, when motorcycle deaths accounted for 9 percent of all traffic fatalities.

Injury rates also dropped. NHTSA reported 88,000 motorcycle rider injuries in 2013, down 5,000 or 5.4 percent from 2012 when it rose to 93,000. There were 81,000 injuries reported in 2011.

Alcohol-impaired fatalities dropped as well. "Motorcycle riders showed the greatest decrease in the number of alcohol-impaired drivers involved in fatal crashes from 2012 to 2013, dropping 8.3 percent or by 117 riders. This was both the greatest percentage drop and the greatest drop in actual alcoholimpaired drivers," NHTSA said.






