KAUTION KORNER

To Pee or Not to Pee!

A very important Question!

We are all aware of the need to drink • water and to keep ourselves hydrated, especially while riding a motorcycle on hot summer days. It 🖕 has been discussed so much we unconsciously pick up that cool bottle of water at almost every rest stop. Studies have shown that surprisingly low fluid losses can significantly affect your ability to ride. A 2% drop in body weight due to sweating will impair performance noticeably, 4% drop will decrease your capacity for muscular work, and at 5%, heat exhaustion can become an issue and your capacity for muscular work will drop by up to 30%. At 7%, you'll start experiencing hallucinations and at 10% circulatory col- Before You Ride lapse, heat stroke and even death become possibili- Expert riders recommend avoiding alcohol the night ties.

So why are we reviewing this subject again? Because the BIG question is – How much water DO we need?

Studies have produced varying recommendations over the years. But your individual water needs depend on many factors, including your health, how active you are and where you live. No single formula fits everyone. But knowing more about your body's need for fluids will help you estimate how much water to drink on rides and each day.

Water is your body's principal chemical component and makes up about 60 percent of your body weight. Your body depends on water to survive. Every day you lose water through your breath, perspiration, urine and bowel movements. For your body to function properly, you must replenish its water supply by consuming beverages and foods that contain water. Only 20 percent of daily fluid intake usually comes from food, so the rest needs to come from fluids.

So how much fluid does the average, healthy adult your daily routine, maintaining optimal hydration living in a temperate climate need? The National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine determined that an adequate daily fluid intake is:

- About 15.5 cups (3.7 liters) of fluids a day for men
- About 11.5 cups (2.7 liters) of fluids a day for women

The Formula

One easy formula to remember is your weight x 67%= the number of ounces per day you should consume. Keep in mind that while riding, the drying effect of the wind and our constant exposure to the elements may increase our vulnerability to dehydration so these amounts would need to be increased.

before and caffeine the day of a motorcycle ride. Both types of beverages are diuretics and can cause your body to force out more water than its taking in. If you must drink coffee to wake up, be sure to drink an adequate amount of water before you jump on vour bike.

While You Ride

The key point to remember is not to wait until you are thirsty, but to drink a little and often right from the start of your ride. Try to take 2-3 good sized gulps from your bottle every 10-15 minutes right from the start.

After You Ride

If you are unable to get enough water into your system before or during your trip, make sure to hydrate as soon as possible after you reach your destination. Slowly and consistently sip water for the rest of your day rather than chugging down a huge amount all at once.

If drinking adequate amounts of water is included in levels when riding will be far easier.

Knowing this will help you plan wisely! Every day and for every ride!

Vodka-powered motorcycle sets speed record By Elisha Thakorlal, | The Sun

A spirit maker has successfully run a motorbike at 113 mph at the Bonneville Salt Flats, having

land - had no previous experience of building a race bike nor had ever raced.

The project was aided by sponsors who contributed \$1,000 (£770), with the bike modifications costing \$5,000 $(\pounds 3,850)$ in total.

The 113 mph average speed achieved is even more incredible given that Ryan was only targeting 98 mph - the thenrecord set back in 2016.

Further to that, the bike had only hit 96 mph in road tests and the salt surface was expected to reduce performance by 10 percent.

Is Inflating Your Tires With Nitrogen Worth It?

Why are we asking this question? Because it's a question that you've already asked us. So, let's evaluate the pros and cons of inflating your tires with regular air versus nitrogen.



The air we breathe in the atmosphere is composed of 78% nitrogen, 21% oxygen, and 1% other gasses plus water in different proportions depending on where it's located.

You've probably heard recently about the use of nitrogen, but did you know that it has been used in the industry for a long time and has been a fundamental element of many products and services?

How's it produced? Nitrogen is obtained by distilling the atmospheric air, which is collected into containers called washing towers where it is submitted to high pressure and cooling, producing liquid air. Next, after a boiling process, the oxygen and nitrogen separate due to different boiling points for each gas. Nitrogen evaporates first leaving oxygen at the bottom as a residue.

Nitrogen is used to preserve biological samples such as blood, tissues, organs, etc. It is also used in the food industry to keep food fresh while frozen or canned and prevents the oxidation of vitamins in drinks. It has other medical uses too as well as other manufacturing applications like the production of electronic components.

Formula One (F1) and the aeronautic industry have propelled and promoted the use of nitrogen for mainstream vehicles. For that reason, nitrogen generators have been developed for use in motorcycle repair shops.

Advantages of inflating your tires with nitrogen:

• Longer tire life. Tire wear is one of the biggest problems usually from riding at low pressure due

mainly to a lack of attention to tire pressure and vehicle maintenance.

Nitrogen molecules are bigger than oxygen molecules which makes it more difficult for nitrogen to



escape through the valves, pores, or where the tire connects with the rim. Oxygen escapes about three times faster than nitrogen.

- Because nitrogen is a dry gas and doesn't contain humidity, it extends the life of the tire while preventing internal rust.
- Due to constant and stable pressure and temperature, the tire's performance is improved.
- Increases fuel economy and thus, reduces CO2 emissions.

Nitrogen is a good ally for demanding road and track riders because it gives better performance. In some motorcycle repair shops, it's included for free with tire installation.



Disadvantages of inflating tires with nitrogen:

- In the case of pressure loss, it's difficult to find a nitrogen source. Although oxygen can still be added, you'll lose all the nitrogen advantages.
- Inflating a tire with nitrogen is usually not free. The average cost per tire is from \$2 to \$6.
- When using nitrogen, it's not necessary to check the tires' pressure as frequently as when using regular air. But, when necessary, only a repair shop with a nitrogen source will be able to adjust the pressure.
- For regular riders, nitrogen has no real advantages.

If you regularly check your tire pressure, inflating them with regular air is good enough and inexpensive. In conclusion, we wanted to remind you that there is more than one option for filling up your tires. We wanted to share with you the possibilities, advantages, and disadvantages of using nitrogen as an alternative to regular air.
