ELIMINATING BAD HABITS

Habits are behaviors we acquire over time, and when they become part of your Top Cats group riding routine, they can be annoying or even dangerous. Most of the your fellow Top Cats are not going to say anything, so we will use this column to mention a few of the more common bad habits that your Road Captains have seen. They are not aimed at any one individual, but if the shoe fits.........

Bad Habit 1: Lack of preparedness for a ride.

We have all seen this. The pre-ride meeting is wrapping up and everyone is excited to get on the road when all of a sudden a Top Cat realizes that he or she forgot to get gas. So the entire group has to wait. Some other common gas up habits include not paying attention to ride instructions, such as the number of miles until the scheduled gas stop, then having to ask for a special stop. The solution is simple. Think ahead. If the start location is at a gas station, top off your tank. If its not then give yourself enough time to gas up prior to arriving.

Bad Habit 2: Lane encroachment.

As you are slowing down approaching an intersection, or even while in a traffic slow down, the rider to your oblique rides up along side of you. This is most annoying and can even startle you. If you're in a fellow riders oblique do not fill the lane until just before you come to a complete stop. We all expect to have the entire lane so there is room to maneuver if necessary. Plus, it's just plain rude.

Bad Habit 3: Leaving the stop before the person in front of you does.

Wait until the person in front actually pulls out before you start to move. There can be any number of reasons that the person is slow getting out. Perhaps, they are seeing something you don't. Keep the clutch in until you are sure it's safe to go, and this includes leaving in turn.

Bad Habit 4: Leaving too large a gap between bikes (when it's safe to be closer)

Leaving excessive space, especially when we are in a large group causes several issues. For

starters with the accordion effect the group becomes split up and way to long. The road captain will lose track and it becomes difficult to keep everyone on the route. It also gives cars opportunities to get between us. This is not always an issue (see bad habit number 5). It also will result in frustration at the back of the pack. Everyone wants to stay with the group as much as possible and if you are in the back and see a fellow rider not keeping up, its easy to lose focus.

Bad Habit 5: Car lane change blocking

When we are riding on an expressway or any limited access highway we must stay cognizant that cars will have to merge in or exit off. Think ahead and give them a break. Create a space and let them get on or off. Some drivers are intimidated enough by the site of 20 bikes crowding the road, and could make bad decisions if backed into a corner.

There are surely other things we should work on improving. One way to help suggest improvement, not only for bad habits but for improvement overall, is to attend a GRASS class on a regular basis and use the class's interactive atmosphere to drive discussions. Everyone should try to attend a GRASS class once a year (as the Road Captains do), but if that's not possible shoot for every other year.

While over 60% of us have been to the class in the last 2 years, that still leaves over a third who have not. All it takes is one of us to forget some part of our group riding protocol and cause an incident. And incident does not just mean a crash. It could result in a fellow Top Cat being afraid to ride by you or causing some altercation.

Come to a GRASS class and get a refresher on all of the ways we like to ride together. You may even discover a bad habit that you may have or be able to *tact-fully* point some out that affect how you ride.



































ROYAL ENFIELD MOTORCYCLES

Since I heard Bob Carmody brought a guest to the charity ride who was sporting enough to ride a Royal Enfield, I thought it appropriate to give a little history on this odd machine.

Through necessity, and in common with most other engineering companies of the day, Enfield didn't restrict themselves to one line. They also made lawnmowers, bicycles and rifle parts for a Small Arms factory in Enfield. A clue lies in their logo which depicts a cannon, which I have to say, is infinitely better than a lawn mower. Their motto of 'Made like a gun, Goes like a bullet' is also evidence of their military involvement. In 1907, the company joined forces with a business with the unlikely name of 'Alldays & Onions', to produce the Enfield-Allday automobile. Fortunately, the onion was dropped. These cars remained in production until 1925.

Royal Enfield produced their first motorised vehicle in 1898, a vehicle that would today be described as a 'Quad'. This early effort had a De Dion-Bouton 2.75 hp engine. As the 20th century dawned, a bicycle with a 150cc engine mounted above the front wheel was introduced. The year after in 1902, a similar machine was fitted with a 239cc Enfield engine. The famous V-Twins appeared in 1910, primarily fitted with a Motosacoche 344cc engine, but later superseded by Enfield's own power unit. The first small, two stroke engines saw the light of day in 1915 with the 200model.

With the outbreak of World War 1 in 1914, Royal Enfield was requested to furnish the British armed forces with machine gun-carrying combinations and stretcherbearing motorcycles. The company also won a contract to supply machines to the Russians. In 1917, when most able bodied men were at war in Europe, a police force made up of women was issued with 600cc Royal Enfield motorcycles.

The time between the wars saw a boom in the popularity of sidecars, and in 1924 a combination using a 350cc single was launched. In 1928, saddle tanks and centrespring, girder front forks were used. Royal Enfield bikes now took on a more contemporary appearance, and despite the economic gloom of the depression years, sales kept steady. A 488cc machine with a four speed gearbox was offered in 1927 and a side-valve 225cc in 1928. It seemed that the company could do no wrong, and during

the thirties, Royal Enfield's catalogue featured thirteen models. This is the time that the famous single cylinder 'Bullet' was born.

As the world once again fell into war, Royal Enfield rose to the occasion to produce a series of motorcycles for military use, the most famous of these being a 125cc bike called the 'Flying Flea'. It was also known as the 'Airborne' because of its capability of being dropped by parachute. Special instruments for war use were also manufactured at this time.

In the fifties, Enfield of India began building machines with parts shipped from Britain, but in 1962 were producing complete motorcycles. Unfortunately, the factory in Redditch, England ceased production in 1970, with the Chennau plant in India still operating. Denomination rights were purchased by the Indians and the name lived on, which today enables Royal Enfield to claim the title of 'The world's oldest motorcycle model'. The bullet is in fact the model with the longest production run.

Between 1955 and 1960, Royal Enfield's were sold in the USA as 'Indian Motorcycles'. This of course had nothing to do with India in the Asian context. The famous Indian motorcycle company had experienced troubles of its own, and this was just another chapter in their particular history. The Americans weren't too keen on badged motorcycles, and when the business agreement expired, Floyd Clymer, who had controversially claimed the 'Indian rights', sought other sources for his venture.

It appears that the 'Enfield' name has plenty of life in it yet. Enfield India continues making motorcycles and is indeed flourishing. In 1986, a civil servant from Britain named Raja Narayan went back to India to create an export arm for Royal Enfield, so in the same way that Raja had returned to his roots, so had the Bullet, which is now marketed in Britain.

Despite production moving from Redditch to India, the marque can claim to be the only one to span three centuries, and who knows, it may even reach a fourth. Whilst the Indian plant goes from strength to strength, the few buildings that remain from the Redditch glory days have been swallowed up by the Enfield Industrial Estate. Blew engine on the way home. Out of oil. Pushed for last mile. Never ran again.




The following is excerpted from a letter in the recent Hog Tales magazine. If you have not yet been persuaded to wear a helmet, this might provide some additional food for thought.
