Staying in the Game

I'm basically a "one long day" rider. I occasionally take a two or three day ride, but since I live in the Chicago area, the middle of the Midwest, that means I ride on a lot of hours on flat ground. I have to admit that sometimes the terrain gets a bit boring, and boring, especially on a warm afternoon after a good lunch, can bring on inattention or drowsy riding. We talk a lot about how dangerous it can be to fall asleep on two wheels at sixty miles per hour, but we don't say much about how to keep alert. No, I don't mean the admonition of your Road Captain to stay alert. That is just a warning. How do you actually do that?

There are several things you can do that have a direct bearing on your ability to stay safe on that long straight road. They are rest, activity, nourishment and interest. First and foremost, is rest. You will be amazed how refreshing a 15 minute nap can be. When you make a rest stop, gas up the bike, grab something for hydration, take a drink and lie down for a short nap. It will help you more than a quarter hour of bullshitting with your buddies.

Activity does not mean you have to stop the bike. You just have to be careful you do it safely without decreasing control, and that you do not take your eyes off of the road. You can make it a point to stretch every few minutes. If you are moving, it will keep you awake and alert... Work out a routine. Lean back as far as you can and pull on the bars. This is great for the arms and back muscles. Stretch each arm and leg. If you have pegs that are under you, stand up, but take caution if you have forward controls or floorboards that do not give you safe footing or if the tank is too wide. Activity does not have to mean a lot of movement. Chewing gum or some chewy candy can give you some action to stay awake. One of my favorite "keep awake" tricks is to pop a sunflower seed into my mouth. Maneuvering it into position to crack with my teeth, scoop out the edible center, and spitting out the hull provides just enough activity to keep you wide awake. (My apologies to Traveler for violation of the first rule of group riding,

don't spit. Have to improvise if you are not the tail-gunner).

Nourishment can have a huge impact on your ability to ride all day without losing focus. Ration the caffeine to the late afternoon when you need it. Drink decaf in the morning. Drinking caffeine free soda, such as Seven-Up or Coke Zero, and the elimination of chocolate can help lower the overall caffeine tolerance of your body. Save the leaded coffee, the regular Coke, or the Red Bull for when you really need them. Eat a light lunch low in fat. Save the steak and alcohol for dinner after the bike is parked.

The last and most important thing you can do to keep on top of the game is interest. There is no such thing as a boring road. You are just not paying enough attention. This summer I rode with the Top Cats to Sturgis and south. Believe me, there are some really straight, flat roads crossing Minnesota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Kansas and Missouri. Make it a point to see everything of interest along the road. Did you know that the average irrigation boom is about a quarter mile long? I measured a few as I rode by. How is the vegetation changing? Flip the GPS to the screen on *Altitude* and see if you are climbing or dropping. What is the average RPM of a windmill? You get the idea. If you are a road captain, come up with some interesting things for the group to look for. Wayne had us watching a little white dot on the horizon grow into the Great Sand Dune National Park for about 75 miles of what would have otherwise been the most unchanging landscape we saw for days. On another day he mentioned that antelope hide in the cattle herds. Every rider stayed wide awake looking for the white animal in the middle of all those black and brown cows. And try to take in and remember some details to put in the Roar article you will write when you get to your destination.

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BATTERY or BOAT ANCHOR?

It seems that every year we hear horror stories of riders stranded or having their plans ruined because of battery problems. Many of our members could both give us recent firsthand accounts. Since it is easier to type an article than it is to push start a friends bike, I thought it prudent to offer some basic recommendations on the care and feeding of a motorcycle battery.

Unlike other batteries, motorcycle batteries are exposed to the two biggest causes of battery failure; vibration and heat. The cause of failure is simple. The plates within a typical battery are made in a grid that contains various compounds such as lead. Heat and vibration cause these compounds to harden and fall off of the grid. When compounds fall off of a plate, that battery cell loses its ability to retain power and the battery becomes weaker or you have a Dead Cell@. The accumulation of these compounds in the bottom of the battery can build up and touch two or more plates. When that happens, the battery is shorted and will not hold a charge. It is now, effectively, a boat anchor. GEL batteries help prevent these particles from falling to the bottom and shorting out the battery. But, GEL batteries are more expensive. Better, but costly.

Heat in a battery is caused by many sources. When you charge a battery, it generates heat. The most common source of excessive heat is overcharging or fast charging the battery. When you charge your battery, take time to trickle charge or slow charge it. This will avoid damaging the plates with heat. Many "Smart" chargers are on the market and no bike should be stored at home without one. Smart chargers and battery tenders simply limit the amount of electricity flowing into the battery thus reducing heat and damage from overcharging.

Another source of heat comes from constantly charging your battery. Whenever you drive, your battery goes through a constant cycle of discharging and recharging. This cycle will, eventually, turn your battery into a boat anchor, normally after two years. However, corroded or loose battery cables will shorten your battery life also. If the cables are not making solid contact with the battery terminals or the starter or the ground connections, your recharging cycle will take longer, generating more heat and possibly damaging your alternator, or regulator. The voltage withdrawn during starting and normal operation will not be totally replaced. Hence, another boat anchor.

If you are not into reliability, headlights at night, electronics that work, and round trips, stop right here. If you are... read on:

Keep your battery clean. Dirt, oil, grease, etc prevent cooling. A dirty battery will not make it easy to spot cracks and read fluid levels. Most batteries are made of clear or opaque plastic so you can see the electrolyte level and the condition of the end grid plates. When checking your electrolyte level, also look for reddish or white discoloration on your plates. This is an indicator of an emerging boat anchor; compounds that have hardened and are about to fall off.

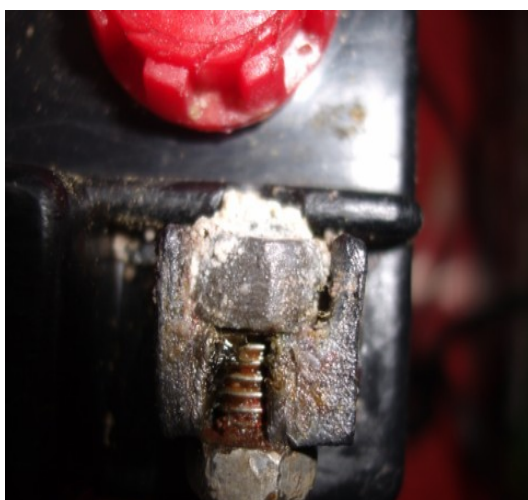
Keep your battery electrolyte topped off. Use distilled water or boiled water. Regular water may have mineral deposits that could build up and cause a short. Boiled tap water will help eliminate mineral deposits, distilled water works well, and pure electrolyte is best.





Do not overfill your battery. The heat will cause the electrolyte to boil over. You then have battery acid all over your engine or transmission cases. Wash it off immediately with a mixture of baking soda and water.

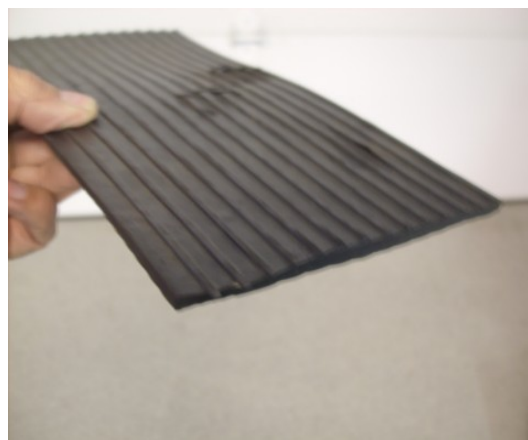
Keep the battery cables clean at both ends. Typically, greenish - white corrosion will appear at the battery end of the cable. An easy and thorough way to clean this is to use a tooth brush and a thick mixture of baking soda and water. Brush it on the cable and let it work on the corrosion a while. Repeat the process until all the corrosion is gone.



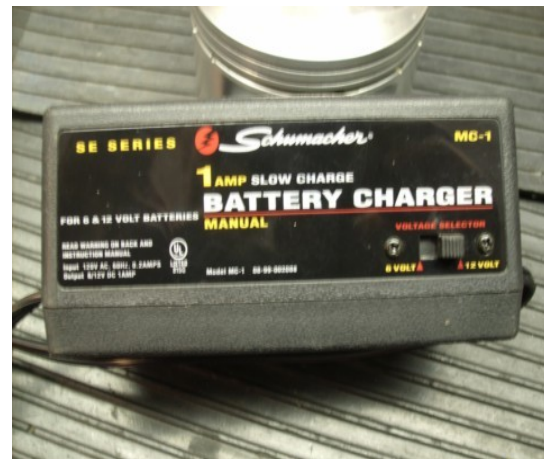
If you don't clean them completely, the corrosion will reappear soon. Coat the terminals with Vaseline or light grease to deter corrosion.



There isn't much we can do to isolate the battery from vibration on a motorcycle. Some manufacturers and after - market shops sell a rubber insert that fits in the bottom of your battery box. This is better than nothing and, when the hold - down strap or the top of your battery box is also cushioned, it does dampen vibration somewhat. The rubber insert also protects your battery box from corrosive residue.



your battery with a charger, as mentioned before, should be done slowly. If you don't have the O.E.M.s recommended charging rate, then a good rule of thumb is to charge at a rate of 10% of the battery rating per hour. A 15 amp battery would be charged at 1.5 amps per hour. If totally dead, it would require a minimum of 10 hours to recharge.



Sealed, maintenance - free batteries, typically found on newer bikes are a different story. They often require a special, low - amp charger. Best bet is to read and abide by your owners manual.

Anytime you work on a battery, overkill safety. Take off your jewelry. Don't smoke because electrolyte vapor is explosive, and remember that you are dealing with hazardous chemicals that require special handling.



Finally, and perhaps most important, it is wise to assume that a battery will not last much longer than two years. It doesn't matter whether it is O.E.M., Diehard, Cryhard, or the Energizer Bunny. Plan on replacing your battery every two years or plan on taking a good book with you every time you ride so you will have something to do while you wait for help to arrive when your scooter won't start.

For long periods of storage or over the winter, a Smart Charger is a good investment. These Smart Chargers stay plugged in and connected to the battery during storage. They automatically monitor the charge level of the battery. They keep the battery charged at peak level and prevent the possibility of cooking your battery by overcharging it.

Muriel reminded everyone to look over the minutes and return them quickly with their changes. At least five board-members must approve the minutes before they are sent to the ROAR publication.

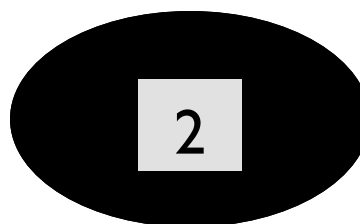
Treasurer- Stewart Johnson

Old /New business

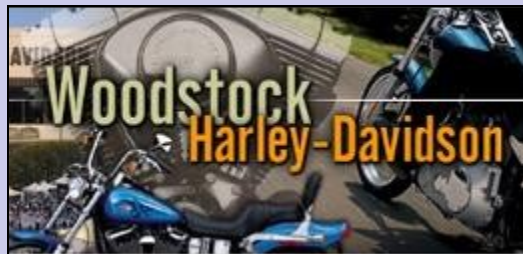
