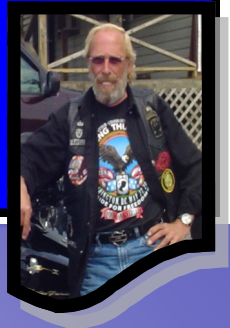
Thank You for the Commitment You Made

A Veteran's Tears

Veteran's Day is a time of reflection for many and is often defined as a day of remembrance only for those who wore a uniform while serving our country. I'm not so sure they're the only veterans...

Decades ago, as an eleven year old in Southington, Ohio, I watched my first Memorial Day parade with my dad. Soldiers, cars, clowns, motorcycles, and old veterans paraded in front of us in memory of wars and a day that I didn't really understand.

The parade ended at a cemetery that had a monument to fallen heroes. As the roll - call of those killed in battle was read, I watched the old soldiers standing at attention and saluting, gray hair, worn uniforms from some other era, wrinkled faces reflecting the horrors of Omaha Beach, Normandy, Dunkirk, Verdun, and the 38th Parallel in Korea. Wow, these were heroes, I thought.

Almost in unison, as a bugler played Taps, I saw tears well up, roll down weather worn cheeks, and lips tremble on those old warriors. My dad's grip on my shoulder became tighter. I was witnessing a sign of weakness on men I thought were heroes. Or was I...

Many years later, after serving two tours in Vietnam as an infantry company and cavalry troop commander and, subsequently serving, in Grenada and Panama, I had the opportunity to attend many parades and ceremonies honoring our Veterans.

Solemn drum beats, rifle fire from honor guards, and the stillness generated by a lone bugler sounding Taps, brought back flashes of hidden memories of fallen soldiers, Medevac choppers, gunfire, body bags, posthumous awards, and headstones. Lips trembled, tears overflowed, knees weakened, and I finally realized what made those old warriors in Southington, Ohio, become so emotional.

Nowadays, as I attend Memorial Day and Veteran's Day ceremonies at such places as Angel Fire, NM during the annual Red River Motorcycle Rally, and Washington, DC during the Rolling Thunder Ride to the

Wall, the emotions are no less intense but, I suppose, just better controlled.

The crowds are the same, black leather, business suites, uniforms, or T-shirts and blue jeans but, through tearing eyes, I see the same respect, the same appreciation and, the same emotions apparent on the faces of those who never wore a uniform, as those who did.

Mothers and fathers who lost a son, brothers and sisters whose relatives sacrificed their lives, children whose fathers never returned and, bikers whose only memory of a friend remains etched on a lonely headstone, only to be brought to life at an annual ceremony.

To me, behind every tear stands a veteran. Perhaps not a veteran of battle, or uniformed service, but a veteran of sacrifice, a veteran of loss, a veteran of the stress of defending democracy through armed conflict, and the impact it has on our families, our friends, our society, and our nation.

Some anonymous writer, during the Vietnam era, penned the phrase "For those who fought for it, freedom has a taste, the protected will never know." I used to believe that only those who fought for it, could possibly understand the hellish sacrifice of defending democracy. Today, I no longer believe that...

On this Veteran's Day, as we remember our servicemen and women who's names are etched in marble, who reside in VA hospitals, who stand beside you at work, who ride next to you in black leather, and who serve today aboard ships and at bases throughout the world, let's not forget their families and friends for their sacrifices as well. I think they'd want it that way...

May God bless each and every American who ever felt their lips tremble and their eyes tear at the sight of our flag, the memory of a fallen serviceman, or the sound of Taps...

ILLINOIS STATE POLICE BEGIN “BIKESAFE” PROGRAM

During the past several years Top Cats – Illinois has been cultivating a strong relationship with the motor officers of the state police. Sergeant Rich and Troopers Liz and Ben have presented at our general meetings several times with each more interesting than the last. One topic always discussed is the introduction of a motorcycle safety program that doubles as a community outreach to motorcyclists.

BikeSafe is traffic safety initiative to reduce crashes and fatalities for motorcyclists. It is also a partnership between the Illinois State Police and other local police departments. It is a proactive approach to engage motorcyclists before they do something unsafe and to partner them with a motor officer for the purpose of an assessment of their existing skills. The program actually began in the UK and is well received by its biking community. North Carolina brought it over the Atlantic; Illinois and some additional states are now adopting it.

Although there has been some delay commencing the program, it was finally launched with a “dry-run” a few weeks ago at the DesPlaines located Chicago area, state police HQ. Trooper Liz Diaz was the classroom instructor for this all-day program that covered practical tips for better and safer motorcycling. The program is not limited to lectures as it includes shocking videos of motorcycle mishaps and yes, fatalities. These “drive home” why we must ride alertly and aware of surroundings and other vehicles. An additional and major feature of BikeSafe is that it is not limited to the indoors but includes “on the road” segments with troopers. The morning road session is about an hour in duration, and the afternoon about an hour and one-half. Both are followed with critiques by at least two troopers who do not

pull punches.

My biggest “take-away” from the program is that you must make sure, when slowing or stopping, to constantly check the mirrors for vehicles approaching from the rear. A large percentage of motorcycle mishaps are directly due to vehicles plowing into you from behind. Another caveat, make sure, if you participate in the training, that your bike is street legal and properly working, including brake and turn lights. Although not discussed, do not attend if you have any warrants out for your arrest as, I am sure, there is a background check on all participants!



PAY ATTENTION

At 60 miles per hour you are covering over 80 feet of roadway per second. Concentrate on the road in front of you and avoid daydreaming. Road debris is not a motorcyclist's friend and can get you in trouble quickly.

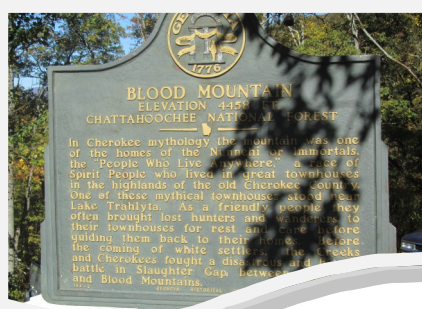
NO SWERVE!!

.....is all I can think of as a black Toyota pick-up truck comes around the sharp S curve ahead of me, head on, fully in my lane. At 500 feet apart, and a closing speed of approximately 90 mph, not much time is available for a mental discussion. I have to react on impulse from my motorcycle training if I am to survive this encounter. This is not how I want my trip to end up!

A week earlier I left home and headed for Blairsville, Georgia to visit a college buddy of mine and his wife at their mountain cabin located in the Chattahoochee National Forest. I make the first day of travel in bright sunshine and warm weather, and with 350 miles now behind me, I over-night in Evansville, Indiana. The second day I'm not as lucky, and find myself in and out of rain showers as I travel through Kentucky, Tennessee, and northern Georgia for the final 350 miles. I greet my buddy outside his garage, and after a while we head down the mountain to a great little restaurant located in Booger Hollow called *Jim's Smok'n Que*. In rural Georgia they smoke almost everything, and I had the best plate of smoked baby back ribs ever!

Blairsville is a small town located not far from Brasstown Bald, considered the highest natural point in the state of Georgia at 4,784 feet, and Blood Mountain, which is the highest peak on the Georgia section of the Appalachian Hiking Trail with



an elevation of 4,458 feet. Both are located in Union County.

We suit up Saturday morning, and after a country style breakfast at the *Owltown Market* also in Booger Hollow, consisting of eggs, country ham (the salty stuff) and grits made with milk (as smooth as mashed potatoes) we head for Huntsville, Alabama. It's a circuitous route through northern Georgia and Alabama that takes us through a well known National Preserve and sightseers' destination called Little River Canyon. This includes miles of twists, turns, and hills next to the rock sided, slate colored canyon walls and boulder laden riverbed.

Arriving at the Huntsville Marriot located on Tranquility Drive, it was only a short walk the next morning to the NASA sponsored U.S. Space and Rocket Center and Museum, the destination for this part of our trip. The Center features more than 1,500 artifacts representing milestone achievements in U.S. space exploration. The U.S. space program began during the Second World War (WWII) after the Allies invaded Germany and convinced a young German rocket scientist named Werner Von Braun to come to the US and develop rockets for space exploration. Von Braun had started a similar program in Germany before WWII, but was enlisted by the Nazis to build rockets that eventually bombed London, France, and Belgium. Von Braun's first stop in the US was Fort Bliss, Texas, but in 1950 he and his team were moved to Redstone Arsenal near Huntsville, where he continued his research on ballistic missiles. Shortly thereafter he and his team of scientists developed the Saturn rockets that provided the foundation of NASA and US space exploration.



We head back toward Blairsville in full afternoon sun, warm temperatures, and mountain leaves beginning to release their autumn color show. This leg includes a stop for lunch at the historic Barnsley Gardens Resort in Adairsville, GA. This was the home to Englishman Godfrey Barnsley (1805-1873) a nineteenth-century American businessman and cotton broker who became one of the wealthiest people in the southeastern United States. This estate withstood the

Civil War as well as a tornado in 1906. In 1988 it was purchased and renovated into a world class resort, complete with gardens, English style cottages, a championship Golf Course, and three restaurants.

Sunday morning after a breakfast at *Cook's Country Kitchen* in Blairsville, we head through the mountains to Helen, GA where we stop at *The Nora Mill Granary* alongside the Chattahoochee River.



Nora Mill is a large four-story building that was built in 1876 complete with 1,500 pound French Burr Mill Stones and a 100 ft. wooden raceway that feeds water to a water turbine - not a vertical water wheel. The mill stone grinds and produces all kinds of corn and wheat based products such as grits, corn meal, pancake & waffle mixes, flours, biscuit & bread mixes, and pioneer's porridge. After some purchases and pictures we head back to the cabin but not before a scenic and twisty ride up to Blood Mountain,

with a stop at Neel Gap in Vogel State Park along the Gainesville Highway. This is primarily a rest stop for hikers on the Appalachian Trail, but is also frequented



by the hundreds of bikers circumnavigating the hills and curves up and down one of Georgia's highest elevations.

Monday morning I'm up and out early, ready to begin my ride north as the sun rises over the Appalachian Mountains to the east. As I pull away the last thing my buddy says is watch out for the deer! As I carefully wind myself down off



Wilson Mountain a small doe and a six point buck hop across the road in front of me. As I work my way north and west on back country roads I eventually find myself turning north onto state route 294, crossing through the south and western most part of North Carolina, as my GPS directs me toward Knoxville, TN.

With the sun to my back, a cloudless sky, 60 degree air temperature, and a beautiful fall color palate in front of me, I relax a little as I wind my way through Murphy, NC. Moments later in an almost surreal fashion, I'm reacting to something I can't believe is happening. That pick-up truck is in my lane! I initially respond by beginning to apply front and rear brakes, but something tells me (maybe the angel on my shoulder) to SWERVE NOW! I execute a swerve out of my lane clearing the right side white line as the truck tears past me in the opposite direction. It was over as quickly as it began, and I pull back into my lane as my heart catches up to what has just occurred, and begins to pump like I am finishing a marathon. The young driver never looks at me, never swerves away at the last second, and never brakes. It was as strange an occurrence as it was frightening. Was he texting? Was he intoxicated? Was he blinded by the morning sun? I'll never know.

I finish the rest of my 500 mile day on the northwest side of Indianapolis. Since the forecast for Tuesday is showing 45 degrees and rain, I wanted no more than 3 hours exposure to these less than favorable riding conditions for the final 200 mile leg.

Back home on Tuesday it feels really good to pull my scooter into the garage and hug my wife. Without the proper training, and a lot of luck, this scenic, memorable, fairy tale of a trip could have ended as a nightmare.

Don reminded new members that they must take a G.R.A.S.S. class within the first year after becoming a member. He also urged members to take classes to improve their riding skills.

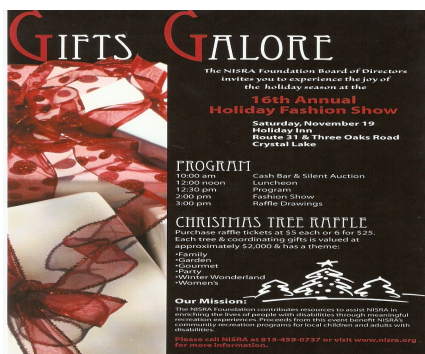

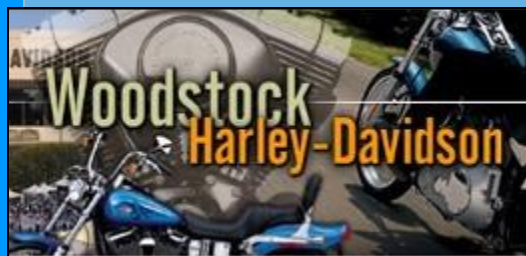
