Winter Riding

Well it takes thin and thick blood and lots of guts. Can it Tire pressure is critical and so are warm tires, to ensure be done safely? Yes with proper pre-cautions, forethought you will have the best traction available. Brake pads and and a few safe practices.

Dressing for Sub-Freezing Temperatures

First when riding in sub-freezing temperatures, it is best to address those temperatures with electric accessories such as gloves, handlebar grips, vests, jackets, and pants/chaps. Now with all of that gear plugged into the bike, best make sure your bikes electrical system can handle all that electri- Weather is always a concern but with freezing temperacal draw without blowing fuses.

If you are a first timer and want to see if this is something you want to do, you might think of trying snowmobile clothing and be sure you enjoy the cold riding before investing money in electric. (I can lend you all sizes.) When using snowmobile clothing, make sure you can operate all the controls safely because it is bulky.

When riding in these cold situations, make sure that no skin is exposed. I still remember using my Honda Shadow



in an emergency situation to ride five (5) miles to the train station when the temp was -22. Although I did not encounter frostbite it took many hours to get warm especially my extremities.

Warming the Equipment

routers need to be warmed before maximum pressure can be applied. So warm them up with light pressure when you first start your ride. Warming the bike before you leave will allow you to use the heat coming off the engine to help keep you and the bike parts warm.

When riding, look far ahead (MSF anticipated path of travel is twelve (12) seconds ahead whenever possible) and be prepared for slick conditions. Remember when encountering them, always slow as much as possible before getting to the slick spot in the road, keep the bike as upright as possible and try not to make any sudden maneu-

All the tips and techniques from fall riding also apply here as well.

What's On Your VP's Mind

Thanks to all who were able to find the time to show their respects at my Dad's visitation. I truly appreciate you standing in line to say hello and share some thoughts with me that day. It meant a lot to me. As

we journey through life, we accumulate some greatmemories to keep us company as we age. I'm happy to report that although I've lost my Father, I still have all of the good memories that he left me. Over the past few months as we've sorted through his belongings and wrapped up the paperwork that comes with death, I am comforted by all of those old memories - lots of great stories and lots of things that we did together.



I wanted to share some thoughts that I feel compelled to discuss as a direct result of my Dad's passing. As a tax professional and financial consultant, I talk to people all day long about preparing for and dealing with death, be it for a family member or themselves. There are a number of things that most people take for granted, but rather everyone should verify all of the details. Many of us are baby boomers, so we're getting older and shouldn't put off these tough decisions. Many of us still have parents around who need to make these same kinds of choices.

Do you have a will? If not, you should. Does your spouse have a will? Do your parents? When was the last time those wills were reviewed and updated? If you are a member of ABATE, they have a lawyer that will generate a will for you as a membership benefit. Although most people have estates that don't require a will, there are some minor items that if you have a will in place, it will make life easier for those you leave behind. If nothing else you will have an executor designated who can take of the multitude of details that need to be addressed.

Do you have a list of exactly what things would need your attention if you were no longer around? Does someone know



where all of your legal and financial documents are? Will they need to know usernames and passwords? Is there a key to your safe deposit box or a combination to your safe? I read an article the other day that after a person passed away, the children could not get the safe open. It ended up at a scrap yard and the scrap yard owner hired a locksmith to open it. In the safe he found lengths of PVC pipe filled with Krugerrands and ammo boxes filled with uncirculated silver dollars. The contents of the safe were estimated to be worth 2.5 million dollars.

Do your bank accounts and securities have TOD (Transfer On Death) designations? If you own a business do you have succession plan in effect? Is there enough cash liquidity in your financial situation to allow your family to pay their bills while your affairs are settled?

Have you looked at your beneficiaries lately? Review those life insurance policies, IRAs, pensions, annuities, 401Bs, 403Bs, 457 plans, anything that can have a beneficiary designation. Leave no stone unturned, so that there won't be any regrets later on. Remember to look at both primary and contingent beneficiaries. Also remember that after the death of a beneficiary you should examine those designations again and make any changes needed.



How Cool? Water Cooled!

Here a few weeks ago, Mother Harley brought out this year's new models. Across the board there are relatively few surprises except on the new Ultra Classic and the new Tri-Glide. A few years ago, I saw where the Harley Davidson Motor Company applied for a patent for water cooled big twin heads. Well, this year they are putting those puppies to use. The top of the line Ultra Classic and the Tri-Glides are the first official "Waterhogs" sporting two small radiators mounted in the fairing lowers in the highway bars. An electric water pump is mounted where a conventional oil cooler used to mount. Adding water cooling does not leave enough room up front for an oil cooler (I'm not a fan of this).



The way the radiators are placed is supposed to direct the heated air away from your legs. I would certainly hope so! I suppose I've known since the advent of the V-rod that water cooling was coming down the pike, but it's a bit of a shock that it is now here. "

Snake River Jump To Help Schools



All of us who were riding motorcycles back in the early 1970s should remember how big a deal it was when Evel Knievel made his futile attempt at jumping the Snake River near Twin Falls, Idaho on his "Skycycle". The attempt fizzled when the rockets chute popped open pre-maturely and Evel was left dangled from the chute as it landed on the rocks next to the river. Luckily Evel came away rather unscathed, as compared to some of his other jumps.

Well it looks like plans for another daredevil attempt to jump the Snake are well under way. To secure the rights to the land on which the jump will be staged, 5 bidders went head-to-head with "Big Ed" Beckley of Beckley Media, LLC; based in Bridgeport, Texas forking over almost one million dollars to the Idaho Department of Lands for a two year lease on an 1,100-acre block of land on the north side of the canyon to be used as a potential landing area.

But the big winner will be the public schools of Idaho. In addition to receiving money from the lease, the schools will also get a certain percentage of media revenues and royalties on event merchandise.

Beckley has until January 1st, 2014, to get any necessary permits or permission from the City of Twin Falls, which owns the land on the south side of the canyon where the attempt will be made from. Source: Idaho Department of Lands

Some laws can be argued for the good of motorcycling while others can be judged detrimental to a personal riding style i.e. helmet laws, noise laws, etc. Regardless, we are seeing motorcyclists' input being considered in a variety of legislation

Among other laws such as handlebar height now allowed above the shoulder and license plates that can be displayed vertically, Illinois has a new law that goes into effect 1 Jan 2014 to create a program administered by the Secretary of State to set standards and establish training for volunteers to become certified motorcycle road guards. A motorcycle road guard would have the authority to stop and direct traffic during a motorcycle group ride if certain conditions are met.

At this time the training and certification is not finalized but, we have discovered that there will be an application fee for certification, specified training, required equipment, and that road guards must coordinate with, and gain permission from, each local jurisdiction for each blocking location.

Illinois Approves 70 MPH Speed Limit

The Illinois Tollway has approved an increase in speed limits on some rural segments of tollways to 70 mph, according to a press release from the Illinois Tollway. The increase would take effect on Jan. 1, 2014 according to the news release.

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A recommendation will also be sent to the Illinois Department of Transportation for concurrence. Once JCAR approves the rule change, the Secretary of State will publish the rule change and the updated signs reflecting the new speed limit will be posted.

The tollway has completed speed limit studies for all non-urban segments of the tollway system. Based on these studies, the tollway will seek to increase the speed limit on select rural segments of the tollway system, including:

The Jane Addams Memorial Tollway (I-90) west of 1170cc flat twin the I-39 interchange in Winnebago County (15 boxer that produces miles).

The Reagan Memorial Tollway (I-88) west of Route signed to custom-47 in Kane, DeKalb, Ogle and Lee counties (64 ize. miles).

The Tri-State Tollway (I-94/I-294/I-80) north of for their own re-Stearns School Road in Lake County (pending placement pieces as speed limit increase on I-94 in Wisconsin) (6 well as those from miles).

If implemented, the new 70 mph speed limit will apply to all vehicles on I-90 and on I-88 west of Kane County.

However, the higher speed limit on the northern portion of the Tri-State Tollway, and an 8-mile segment of I-88 in Kane County extending west of Route 47 to the DeKalb County border, will apply only to passenger and commercial vehicles weighing no more than 8,000 pounds, or 4 tons.

The speed limit for larger trucks on those two segments will remain at 55 mph, the limit currently set by the state's vehicle code for trucks in the Chicago metro area, which includes Cook, DuPage, Kane, Lake, McHenry and Will counties.

By law, the current minimum speed limit on the Tollway system is 45 mph.

As part of the changes to the administrative rules apto increase the minimum speed limit from 45 mph to keep traffic flowing evenly.

Wow! BMW's New R nine T

BMW is celebrating "90 Years of BMW Motorrad" with the new BMW R nine T, a roadster designed to



have a hand-built retro look and is easy to customize. The bike will be available in spring 2014. An MSRP announcement is forthcoming.

The R nine T is powered by an

110hp and is de-BMW they are allowing aftermarket manufacturers.



The subframe is removable to switch from two-up capabilities to a café racer look, with an aluminum tail cover. The swingarm will accommodate a 17-inch wheel with a six-inch width for riders who want to go slightly bigger.

The tubular frame is two pieces, a front main frame and a rear main frame, so the rear section can be replaced with an alternative piece.

With such attention to making customizing easy, BMW is ready with a long list of options. A custom seat, carbon engine covers, a carbon front fender, heated grips, LED turn signals and bags for the tank and rear are part of the list. Even the rider is customizable, since BMW suggests gearing up with the BMW Motorrad Style Vintage collection.

The spoked wheels preserve the old-school look, but the inverted forks come from the BMW S 1000RR proved by the Board today, the tollway will also seek for new-school suspension. BMW really takes the retro feel to heart in the tank and body. The tank is 55 mph where the speed limit is 65 or 70 mph to help brushed by hand and then coated, while the forged aluminum throughout the motorcycle is glass beadblasted before getting a natural anodized finish. In my case, my Dad is the primary beneficiary on everything she has.

We will need to submit primary beneficiary designation changes and review and/or update the contingent beneficiary designations as well. Don't overlook the "benevolent death benefits" from many non-traditional sources; such as credit card companies, credit unions, associations like ABATE, NRA, AAA, etc. and others.

Ownership changes should be reviewed as well. When was the last time you looked at ownership of your assets? If you're married, is your spouse's name on the titles to your property - cars, homes, etc? Whose name shows up on the property tax bill? How about the assets of your parents? In my case, I need to make sure that my parent's jointly held property is now titled correctly. Some of these items are things that I've never thought of before and for most of us the first death in a family is when we get introduced to this learning curve.

Have you wondered about what happens if you can no longer make decisions about your well being? Having health and fi-



nancial directives in place before then is very important. What I've found to be of great value in order to make this process easier is a document called *The Five Wishes*. It can be obtained from an organization called "Aging With Dignity." *The Five Wishes* is written in easy to understand language and is a serviceable legal document, recognized in all 50 states, that will let your family and doctors know important information about you like:

- 1 Who you want to make health care decisions for you when you can't make them.
- 2 The kind of medical treatment you want or don't want.
- 3 How comfortable you want to be.
- 4 How you want people to treat you.
- 5 -What you want your loved ones to know.

Someone once told me that we all have expiration dates, but no one knows what theirs is. There are so many things to do before we die or become incapacitated. By taking the time now to face the tough questions we can make the transitions easier for those left behind to manage our affairs.

Well that's what was on my mind this month!

GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING MINUTES SEPTEMBER 3RD, 2013



Product catalogues are available and orders can be taken by Emil tonight. A shirt will be given away tonight with the raffle (Continued on page 13)












