It's one of the most im- L (Lights and electrical) portant prerequisites to your first ride of the season ... and every ride for that matter. That is why you hear it over

and over. Of course I am referring to TCLOCS.

TCLOCS is an acronym, which was created by the MSF (Motorcycle Safety Foundation) to help riders remember to check and verify the condition and func- O (Oil and Fluids) tion of critical systems of your bike, including Tires and Wheels, Controls, Lights and Electrical, Oil and Fluids, Chassis and Side stand. There are variations of TCLOCS I have heard of, but this a base.

Your owners manual will have much of the infor- C (Chassis) mation you will need to perform TCLOCS, but you may need to look online, purchase a shop manual or

ask the service folks at your local dealership.

Below are the basics. I will have a full TCLOCS form sent out in the next week. each time you ride.

Headlight (low/high beams)

Directions indicators (Left and Right, Front and Rear)

Stop/Plate

Dash/fairing/gauges lighting

Check engineer oil level Check clarity

Handlebars

Head bearing smooth but not loose

S (Side stand)

Make sure it moves smoothly. Lubricate as needed





BOOTS

Provide protection against foot and ankle injuries and give you a good grip on footpegs or road surfaces.

BOTTOM LINE

Proper riding gear protects in the event of an accident and minimized injuries, when allowing you to enjoy the sport in comfort.

HEAD

Considered precious by knowledgable riders and never exposed by the pros. When fully in view, allows immediate indentification of untrained person not using his. Hand out rider education info on site !

EYES, EARS & FACE

Known to experienced riders as "bug and garbage collectors." Common "bare-face" symptoms include windblast-deafening and deformed, narrow-sit, watery eyes.

HANDS

au naturale [not for long]. Known to seize into curled position when exposed to cold; not genetically evolved to withstand abrasion.

BARE LIMBS

A phenomenon seen only on riders deemed impervious to any unavoidable accident or inclement weather. Subject to ridicule in riding circles.

FLIP FLOPS

Terminology for what sandals, toes and feet do upon contact with road surfaces, shift lever, brake pedal, footpegs, or windblasts.

BOTTOM LINE

Fool's gear identifies an untrained rider. Learn how to avoid embarrassment, ridicule and injury, while gaining skills and knowledge by contacting the Rider Course nearest you.
