# KAUTION KORNER

"It's that time... to take out and shake out your bike and yourself and get ready for your (our) first group ride"

# Shake it Out!

By: Gene "Lucky" Rigsby, Sr. Road Captain and President of Top Cats Illinois!

Most every early or pre-riding season article I've seen is about preparing your bike, prepping yourself and starting off slowly to rebuild the muscle and mental memory to get moving at a higher speed, safely on the road again. This article will be no different as it is a very important process in kicking the riding season off right, and with our kick off ride quickly approaching, which I am planning now, the time to prepare is now. Just like any other ride during the season, the RC will expect everyone attending the first ride of the season to be prepared mechanically, physically and mentally, and this article will help you get there.

Before getting to the nitty gritty, a note to all that may winter store their bike with a dealer and have the bike prepped or

"summarized" so they just have to pick it up and go. Great if you do, but I would warn you to trust but verify. I know some of our club members have had out of storage issues, so keep in mind that no matter how good the service is from your dealer, people make mistakes and remembering it is your rump on that seat, maybe a loved one riding with you as well, and let's not forget about a whole group of club members you may be riding with for your first ride... That's not a risk I would like to take or have taken with me riding in the group.

First. Let's talk about your bike and getting your bike out of storage and ready to ride. (Continued on page 3)





#### Kaution Korner, Continued

I do not dealer store/prep, so this is what I need to do to get my bike ready.

By the way, some of the items in the "Obvious" list are part of T-CLOC(S/K), which is a great tool for getting and keeping your bike in top riding condition throughout the season, but I added important notes here in case you didn't 

Addressing your bike -

Start off with some obvious items like:

Coverings - Remove all covers or plugs you may have Lights - Make sure that you can see and others can see you used to keep dust off and pests out

Look for leaks – Check for leaks BEFORE you move your bike from it's winter storage area. If you noticed any spots on the floor you may want to trace the leak to it's origin and repair the cause. Look over the shocks and forks as well.

Tip: If you think you have a leak but it is hard to determine new spots from old spots on your floor, place a cut open brown paper bag under your bike to help highlight new leaks.

Battery – Install if needed and check if the charge level is good. Charge, "jump" or replace as needed. Reset electronics as needed. I would recommend Battery + for help with your battery. They will test the old one and install the new one for free (won't take a tip either)

Gas – Top off if not already and run some fresh fuel into ule. the fuel system

Oil and lubes – Check levels and/or change as needed

Wash – A good time to wash as you may have items that you remove for storage (I do)

**Inspect for loose parts** – You can do this as you wash as you are touching all the parts anyway

Replace add-ons - Now that the wash is done... But I would not recommend adding new things at this point. Wait until after you have had a chance to ride the bike first and make sure nothing is broken. Then when you add the new thing, if something does not work, you can somewhat safely new thing on, rather than an out of storage issue.



After you have your bike Prevent out of storage but before down the road by

Performing a T-CLOCS or T-CLOCK review is a great way to start examining your bike. As all bikes are different, you must look up the proper specs and adjustments for

your bike. There is a lot of online help if you need a hand getting started.

T-CLOCS/T-CLOCK (with some key points):

Tires or Wheels -Inspect your tires for damage such as cracks or dry rot. Check the tread – are both tires in good shape or do they need replacing? Worn tread can make your bike harder to handle, so don't overlook this important safety check.Look for flat spots from storage.

**Controls** - Test all of your controls to ensure that your bike is road ready. Check your steering, clutch, throttle and other key controls. This is the time to address any problems.

by checking your lights. Make sure your headlight (high and low beams), taillights, brake light, turn signals and flashers are all in working order. Replace any bulbs that are burned out.

Oils - If you didn't change your oil and oil filter at the end of last season, this is the ideal time to take care of this key maintenance step. Consult your owner's manual for the proper oil filter and oil to use.

Check and top off all the other fluids in your engine including brake fluid, coolant, transmission oil, hydraulic clutch fluid and fork oil. Look for any changes in consistency and color of the fluids. If you suspect that any of the fluids have degraded, you may need to perform a system-specific flush like a coolant flush or a flush of the brake system. Check your owner's manual for the recommended service sched-

**Chassis** - Look for rust, crack in welds, dents, wear marks

Stands / Kick-Stands - Inspect and lubricate

A few additional items to review:

Because you never know when you'll need to apply your brakes, this is the perfect time to take a close look at your bike's braking system. Start by checking the brake pads: if they show signs of excessive wear, replace them. Take a look at the brake lines, keeping an eye out for any cracks or leaks. Finally, perform a test on both the front and rear brakes to make sure they are working properly. If you hear any squealing, scraping or growling noises, have your meassume it is because of the new thing or the work to get the chanic check it out before you take your bike out on the road.

> problems checking your motorcycle's spark plugs. If any are dirty or show signs of damage, replace them before you are

left stranded on the side of the road.

Take a moment to inspect your **drive chain or drive belt** for cracks or signs of wear that could cause it to malfunction. Also check the tension to ensure that it's at manufacturer specs. Take care of any issues now before it ruins a day of riding.

This is also a good time to look over and try on your gear so you don't find a "gotcha's" when getting ready for or out on, your first group ride. Finally, don't neglect your riding gear. Check your helmet for cracks or other signs of damage that could compromise it. If you see any issues, replace it immediately. Many manufacturers recommend getting a new helmet every five years regardless of whether you see

any visible damage.



Replace gloves and boots that have become worn and invest in a new visor if yours is scratched. Also look at your emergency road kit – is it complete? Replace any items that may have been taken out.

#### Now to get yourself ready-

After you have your bike in riding shape, take your bike out for a short ride (alone and without the bike loaded down) to see if anything seems out of place or adjustment and address. When all is ready, you need to take some time ramping up your riding complexity to get really reacquainted with your bike. Then add your normal load and then a passenger if you want, all before you dedicate yourself to a group ride.

I know this sounds like a lot to do before getting out on your (our) first group ride but keep in mind that this is as important as having everyone in our club (and for that matter, as many other folks in the riding community) attend G.R.A.S.S. on a regular basis for the safety of the group, and I believe you would expect this same level of preparation from other folks attending our (or any other) rides you would attend.

#### **Prep Your Motorcycle for Spring**

Preparing your motorcycle for spring riding is essential for a safe and enjoyable experience. Here are some tips to get your motorcycle road-ready in the spring:



- 1. Check the tires: Look for cracks or signs of wear and make sure the pressure is correct.
- 2. Inspect the brakes: Make sure the brake pads have enough thickness, and the brake fluid is at the correct level
- 3. Change the oil: Change oil and filter if you didn't do it before storing the motorcycle during the winter months.
- 4. Check the battery: If you haven't used a battery tender during the winter, the battery may be discharged. Charge the battery and make sure the connections are clean and tight.
- 5. Check the fluids: Check the coolant, transmission fluid, and hydraulic fluid levels.
- 6. Clean the air filter: Remove and clean or replace the air filter as necessary.
- 7. Lubricate moving parts: Lubricate any moving parts that need it, such as the chain, cables, and throttle.
- 8. Check the lights and electrical system: Make sure all the lights work correctly, and the wiring is in good condition.
- 9. Inspect the suspension: Check the forks and shock absorbers for leaks and damage. If there are any issues, have them repaired or replaced.
- 10. Take a test ride: Take a short ride to check for any problems or issues that need to be addressed before taking a longer ride.

mare. One of the most powerful options available those seeking a used bike is Craigslist, which offers more listings and search options than

your local classifieds section. However, Craigslist comes with its own set of pitfalls and hurdles so it's important to know ahead of time what they are so you just gotten lost along the way, this isn't unusual. can avoid problems.

First step is to decide definitively what you're looking headache to your transaction. for. When you're shopping for a bike it's important to have narrowed your search to a few specific models that fit your needs. It's also important to have decided ahead of time what you're willing to pay, what condition is acceptable, and any other make it or break it issues. Making these decisions prior to your search will save you a lot of time, and potentially save you a lot of money.

Once you have narrowed your search down to a few models it's time to hunt. Begin your search in your local area then, if you don't find what you're looking for, expand your search to nearby cities. Once you've found a potential candidate, make sure there's no scam involved. Here are some potential warning signs:

• The bike is in your local listings, but, for whatever reason, needs to be shipped. This is almost certainly a scam unless the listing is from an actual dealer.

• Though not a definite indi- hasn't been taken cation of a scam, if the pic- care of, and, if it's tures show an out of state bad enough, of serilicense plate, be wary.

Escrow companies, though also not always a scam, are nevertheless to be avoided. Paying cash in person is always the best option.



If the sellers name doesn't match the name on their email address, be careful.

- Buying a used bike If the buyer is requesting a money wire transfer, this can turn into a night- is almost certainly a scam.
  - And of course, if the price is too good to be true, it most likely is.
  - Make sure there are no title or other legal issues with the bike. Ask the seller if he has the clear title in hand. If he doesn't, ask why. Many times if the bike is older the title has

Aside from scams and title/legal issues, the bike itself is also very important, here are a few of the many things to look for when visually inspecting a bike:



• When you first show up at the seller's house, check to see if the engine is warm, a stone cold bike can be harder to start than a warmed up one. While this doesn't necessarily indicate any treachery on the seller's part, it's good

to know whether the bike is starting up warm or cold.

 Look for rust anywhere on the bike; this can be an indication that the bike ous structural is-



sues. Also look for rust inside the fuel tank as this can lead to serious money down the road.

• If the bike is chain driven, check the chain and sprockets. Chain upkeep is one of the simplest and most fundamental aspects bike maintenance,



#### High or Low Octane?

For many of us, the octane numbers such as 85. 87, 89, and 91 (or 93) on the gas pump might well read



pump depends entirely on the specific motorcycle, riding style, and conditions. Incorrect choices can rob riders of performance, damage the engine, and waste

Octane is a measure of gasoline's resistance to selfignite during the compression stroke before the spark plug fires. The octane ratings represent an average between "Motor" octane and "Research" octane. which are two different methods of testing octane. yielding different results.

In a gasoline engine, if the cylinder pressure is too great as the piston compresses the air-fuel mixture, the fuel will explode prematurely as the piston is still



rising. This is called "detonation" and it can blow holes in pistons if allowed to continue. To put it simply, the higher the octane number, the more resistant it is to deto-(Continued on pg 7) nation.

ing or idling, it is very low, and while under a heavy Motzko, vendor development with Drag Specialties. load, the need for octane soars. Some of the factors that determine what octane an engine needs include: ignition timing curves, air-fuel mixture, combustion chamber design, compression ratio, camshaft profiles, port designs, exhaust design, air temperature, barometric pressure, engine temperature, load, and rpm. For example, you might consider premium durout, and regular over the winter or when it's cold.

Air-cooled engines typically run hotter cylinder head temperatures than liquid-cooled engines; therefore, they may need higher octane despite their lower compression ratios. For example, many Harley-Davidsons run around 9:1 compression ratios, but the factory recommends premium fuel. Yet the Honda CBR954RR had 11.5:1 compression and was designed to run on regular gas—thanks to cooler running and an excellent combustion chamber design.

Engines with lean air-fuel mixtures also run higher selling combustion chamber temperatures, which raises the only 387 octane requirement. Usually a rider will hear a metal- in 2021. lic rattling sound (commonly called pinging) coming from the engine when one places it under load if the octane is too low.

According Brandon Kraemer, vice president, product and electrification at Indi-Motorcycle, "With so much of motorcycle's character coming from the internal combustion gine, the market acceptance of an

electric powertrain will not be easy or quick," Kraemer warns. "Manufacturers... must think differently and experiment with different technology to see what unknown benefits a potential electric version could have. There will be a lot of innovation happening around EVs in the next 10 to 15 years, so hang on it's going to be interesting!" (Continued on pg. 8)

#### Angepasst (Customized)BMW?

Daytona Bike Week brings out some of the wildest custom motorcycles from some of the most talented builders. One such builder is Fred Kodlin, who built a wild custom BMW R 18 with his son Len. The low and long R 18 got even more extreme thanks to the father and son team making drastic changes to lower its gas tank, seat, and steering neck. Add in custom air suspension, and when this bike is parked there is not much that recalls the factory BMW Motorrad creation. While extreme for most tastes, from the paint to the stance, this bike stands out from the crowd at Daytona Bike Week.



Interestingly, there are a surprising amount of factory parts hidden under that custom paint to make the whole

bike feel cohesive. The brake calipers, gearshift and foot-brake levers, and footrests are all the factory pieces, meaning that BMW must have done something right if customizers with as much vision as the Kodlins did not feel the need to do anything more than change the color ... though they did decide to re-engineer the frame.

In the beginning, our rides were not organized as well as they are today. We used to

Meet at Egg Harbor in Barrington to start most of our rides. This was when our Founder was still with us. We would discuss where we wanted to go and come to

a conclusion. We would select a leader who had a pretty good grasp on a route and we would take off. We did adhere to our riding spacing protocol as it exists to-day, most of the time.

However there was this ride today referred to as the ride "from HELL". It took place on a Saturday evening and include using the Tollway to get to our downtown destination. The aquarium as I remember. On the tollway riders were buzzing around the leader which created some very unsafe conditions especially because they were only vaguely familiar with the route, causing even more confusion as we approached downtown by missing exits. When we arrived, there was no parking plan. When we left there the aquarium was no plan on how to get home.

This situation became the inspiration for what is now known as GRASS.

Everything that was considered a hazard was address in the development of the basic components of GRASS. Our hand signals which we simplified with just five. We later added pointing to the gas tank to create a stop and tapping the top of our helmet to signify a cop ahead later to be known as an emergency vehicle ahead. This rounded out our current seven hand signals.

Along with that we incorporated our spacing criteria. Later adding passing rules. We also created a Road Captain information segment. And soon after that added our rider expectations. As it grew, we added the two up recommendations. And then our accident scene management module.

Now you know the rest of the story! The evolution of our GRASS presentation. Now you know how and WHY it became the safety backbone of our TOP CATS origination. The information is logical and has been determined to increase motorcycle safety. Because of that it has been distributed to many local and INTERNATIONAL organizations. 




