







When was the last time you checked your Riding Gear?

Safe equipment is just important as a safe attitude and cycle!

Don't wait until you are on a ride to do your check! Start before the ride begins... or before the season begins!

Lets start out with your **helmet**? Did you drop it last year? Are there any cracks on the outside? What about the liners? I am referring to the Styrofoam liner along with the cloth liner. Did you wash the liner before retiring the helmet in the winter? If the liner can be removed, take it out and wash it. Don't throw it in the washing machine, though, wash it by hand and allow it to air dry. But, if they are dry and crumbling, now is the time to replace the helmet.

Next let's check your **rain gear** for holes, zipper functions, snaps etc. Are you still riding with that black rain gear you bought back in 2000? Is it really safe to wear something that is not reflective and blends in with your black ride when caught in the rain at night? For your own safety as well as the safety of the rest of our chapter members, please take a look at the newer reflective color gear.

We have all tried to be frugal by trying to reason that I really don't get caught in the rain that often, so why should I spend so much money for an expensive suit? Over the years I figured out you get what you pay for. I always recommend that you go to your favorite dealer and try on the various styles and sizes so the one you buy fits well rather than ordering one on line and taking chances.

In addition to the suit, the type of **gloves** you wear in the rain can make a big difference in controlling your bike. Being a scuba diver in my younger life, I found that neoprene diving gloves are great for wet weather, because they help to keep in your body heat while improving your grip.

Now that we have looked at the rain suit ,how about your heated gear. When was the last time you wore the heated jacket, vest, pants or gloves? Check this equipment out for fit and function. Possibly you've gained a couple of pounds and they just don't fit as well as they once did.

Working our way from head to toes, how about your **boots**. Now is the time to polish and inspect them for cuts, rips, etc. Do they need new heels, soles or do you need to break down and get new boots?

Doing all of this before the season gets busy will allow you to take your time, do some research and get it right!

Don't get caught with faulty gear, check it out now! And like I said in the beginning of this article: Safe equipment is just important as a safe attitude and cycle.


Safety Systems Continue to Surge

Road-rage shootings on the rise



courtesy: john snow A recent report from advocacy group says that roadrage fatal shootings have increased every year since 2018, when 70 road-rage shooting deaths occurred. In 2022, that number doubled, to 141. Nonfatal injuries increased

from 176 "to a staggering 413 people in 2022. These incidents translate to a person being shot and either injured or killed in a road rage incident in 2022 every 16 hours, on average."

According to the report, the five states with the most roadrage shootings are New Mexico, Arizona, Oklahoma, Tennessee, and Wisconsin, which make up 8 percent of the U.S. population, but accounted for 20 percent of road rage shooting victims.

U.S. mandates invehicle DUI detection ...

before tech is ready



The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act from late 2021 was known largely for funding a wave of electricvehicle charging services. But buried deeper inside was also a mandate for a new technology that has nothing to do with EVs. The law calls for a final rule to

be issued next year requiring all vehicles sold in the U.S. to have the ability to passively detect when drivers are under the influence of alcohol and prevent them from driving. That's a piece of technology that does not exist yet at least, not as a commercialized market-friendly originalequipment vehicle component. So the auto industry is scurrying to come up with the technology.

It appears that Asahi Kasei, a Japanese company, may have a head start. It has had a Swedish subsidiary working on alcohol and gas detection sensors for other applications for 25 years. It is now working with a consortium of interested parties, including automakers, Tier 1 suppliers and government agencies, to move the technology into commercial feasibility—and to do so in a hurry, according to the director of North American mobility for the company. The law could ask to see the technology on the road as early as 2026. Where the automotive industry goes....so follows the motorcycle industry. However....this might well be a good thing for our survival.

Motorcycles Without Engines?

Lawmakers supporting H.R. 1435 say it is important that the EPA does not permit CARB's ZEV (zero emissions vehicle) mandate to take effect, as it could lead to 17 other states that have followed all or part of California's previous clean-car rules adopting similar proposals.

Pushed by Clean Air Initiatives, States are finally embracing pro-motorcycle legislation from coast to coast, with many states considering laws to prohibit anti-biker profiling by law enforcement, allow motorcyclists to filter between traffic lanes, and eliminating helmet laws.

Tennessee has two legislative efforts: SB 1450 would create a four-year pilot program excluding adults 21 and older from wearing a helmet unless they are insured under the state's Medicaid program; and bills HB 1454 and SB 0298 which "authorizes two-wheeled motorcycles to be operated between rows of stopped or moving vehicles in the same lane on certain limited access highways and interstate highways when the speed of traffic is 25 miles per hour or less."

For most States in the U.S., lane splitting is considered illegal, but more and more are considering legislation that re-examines the scope and possibilities such as Colorado's HB 23-1059 that seeks to fund a feasibility study titled "A Bill for an Act Concerning Studying Permitting Motorcycles to Drive Around Motor Vehicles Traveling in the Same Direction.

A new lane filtering bill is under consideration in Oregon again, and SB 422 is substantively identical to a 2021 bipartisan bill to allow riders to operate between lanes of slow-moving traffic on a highway, but that bill was vetoed by then-governor Kate Brown.

32nd state with partial or no helmet laws, with the introduction of Legislative Bill 91 on January 5, 2023, which would exempt riders 21 or older who have passed an approved rider training course.

Banishing Kids from Motorcycles



While some states require that a passenger's feet touch the footpegs to legally ride on the back of a motorcycle, indicating adequate physical stature, New York and Georgia are attempting to restrict passengers by a minimum age.

A New York law would "Prohibit children under twelve from riding on a

motorcycle," while SB71 in Georgia states; "Motorcycle passengers shall be no younger than 16 years of age," \Rightarrow Both bills have been referred to their respective committees where staunch opposition can be expected from rider groups.

TAYTAY Institutes "No Helmet Policy"



Com'on man! Helmets or not?

The former Kingdom of \Rightarrow Taytay in the Philippines has enacted an executive order forbidding riders ⇒

from wearing helmets.

In 2009 law in the Philippines, mandated all motorcycle riders, and their passengers, wear a helmet. But this year, Executive Order (EO) No. 62, now "prohibits motorcycle riders, as well as their passengers, from wearing safety helmets, masks, and similar objects while riding on municipal roads within the territorial jurisdiction of Taytay."

The new law was enacted in response to the rising incidents involving "unknown motorcycle driving assailants" who "carry out crimes and escape arrest from police au- ⇒ thorities," and authorizes deputized enforcers to require riders and their pillions to remove their helmets, balaclava, or similar face covering while riding on city streets.



Good Habits and Preflight Checks

We try to practice good riding techniques and develop good habits as safe motorcyclists. Have you ever thought of expanding your riding habits to pre-season preparation? It's pretty simple and it will save you embarrassment,

> frustration and, maybe even avoid unsafe situations.

Every year, probably out of boredom, I check the following:



⇒ **Maps**: Typically, maps will require updates as well as such databases as dealership, hospital, police, hotel, restaurant and gas station locations.

- **Roadside Assistance:** There are many roadside assistance programs available like AAA, Road America, etc. They are an outstanding addition to your riding program not only for you but, with some programs, you can use them to help a friend in need. Usually, they are a one-time only assistance program so, read the fine print closely.
- ⇒ First Aid Kit: Check the condition and expiration dates of everything in your first aid kit to be sure that your kit is current, up to date, and complete. Remember, someone might have to use it on you.
- Helmet Condition: Wash it. Try your dishwasher on a low setting. Then, Check padding and lining for any deterioration.
- **Goggles:** Check any and all eye protection, even night glasses and helmet shields for scratches. Refrain from trying to polish away any scratches. It seldom works and will become a major problem at night.
- Glasses / Contact Lenses: If you wear prescription glasses / contacts, carry a spare pair. Even an older prescription is better than no spare.
- Check for Recalls: Find your VIN and go to https:// www.nhtsa.gov/recalls to check for any safety recalls. Do this early on so you can have the recall applied before your riding season.
- IPass Expiration: Every IPass has an expiration date. Check it before the season starts and renew it if necessary.



⇒ License Expirations: Obviously we need to keep our drivers li-

cense up to date and assure that we have a motorcycle indorsement. BUT, don't forget to check the expiration date of your FOID and any State Conceal Carry Licenses you have. You don't want any license to expire halfway thru a trip.

- ⇒ Owners Manual: Some motorcycle manufacturers publish changes to their operators manuals, particularly when it may relate to a recall. Check your manufacturer's website.
- Maintenance Intervals: Be sure that your next scheduled service doesn't come up during an extended trip or even a weekend trip. Waiting in a dealership for your bike to be serviced while all of your buddies are out riding is a clear waste of time and should be....illegal.
- ⇒ **Insurance Expiration:** Just like anything that has an expiration date, be sure that your insurance doesn't come due during an extended trip.
- Vehicle Registration: You wouldn't want to ride with an expired registration in Illinois or any other State. It is, in fact, a violation. Try to make sure that your registration renewal doesn't occur while vou are on a trip or, make provisions for renewing it before Outside the car six different motorcycles revved their enyour trip.

Do loud pipes really save lives? New research says no (But, they really sound cool!)



widely held belief that noisy exhausts are a safety feature has been disproven by researchers in Romania and the Netherlands.

A study by the Association for the Development of Motorcycling in Romania, along with the Department of Road Vehicles at the Polytechnic University of Bucharest, and Netherlands-based specialists Enviro Consult, concluded that even the loudest pipes can't be heard in modern cars.

The scientists measured the sound heard inside a car with the windows up, the engine running, and the radio playing at a level low enough for easy conversation.

> Another bit of insurance is to carry chemical hand warmers. They feel great inside your gloves, on the back of your neck, in your shirt pockets and, be careful but, you can put one in your helmet for a short time. They heat up quickly.

important thing you can do is to BE THERE! Warm your heart by warming others' hearts!



♦ Rich Gruner (ABATE)

The meaning of "ABATE" is "A brotherhood aimed to educate". ABATE is pushing for red underglow brake lights; and, for 2 bills working through the House: HB1248 – underglow lighting and wrap around turn signals, and HB 2582 – This will remove duplicate testing at the Secretary of State. Rich Gruner also discussed "lane filtering" where you can filter to front to avoid getting hit but traffic must be stopped, and "lane shouldering" which allows shoulder riding. ABATE also is fighting for the ability to choose safety gear.

 Additionally, Wayne discussed Act 2021 regarding infrastructure; and HS 1435, Americans right to choose the kind of motor they have.


