

Recognizing the challenges faced by Older **Motorcycle Riders!**

For many motorcyclists, riding is a lifelong passion. As we vision an aged rider can find riders age, however, we face increasing challenges to riding our motorcycle. Understanding these physical challenges and proactively addressing them can help aging riders stay safe. Here, we'll take a look at those challenges faced by older motorcycle enthusiasts to help you, hopefully, stay safer on the roads.

More safety concerns exist for the aging motorcyclists than younger ones. Riding beyond our growing limitations can prove serious or even fatal. Aged riders is defined as a motorcyclists 40 years old or older and the average age of motorcycle fatalities in the United States is 43 years old. Motorcyclists over the age of 40 are the most likely to die in a motorcycle accident, accounting for more than half of all motorcycle fatalities.

Aging brings natural physical changes that can impact motorcycle riding. Reduced strength, flexibility, vision, hearing, reflexes, and stamina are common as we get older. As a result, activities like riding our motorcycles that were once easy become more difficult and hazardous on our make riding more hazardous. Worsening balance can hapmotorcycles.

For motorcycle riders, diminished vision can make it harder to spot road hazards and read signs. Hearing loss may prevent riders from noticing important sounds like emergency sirens. Reflexes and reaction times become slower, which can make it harder to respond quickly to changing road conditions. Reduced strength and flexibility can affect their control of the motorcycle. Older riders may struggle with tasks like lifting a heavy bike, looking As we age, our bodies can develop other physical condiover their shoulder, or braking hard in an emergency stop. These are some of the areas of particular concern for aging motorcyclists.

Vision

Aging causes eyesight changes like experiencing eye floaters which are small specks, threads, or clumps that drift across your vision. Cataract replacements are common now which can lead to a reduced ability to read. With glasses with a progressive prescription, you may still be age. There is no reason that, with care, caution and adjustable to see far but not be able to read your instruments. ments, we can keep on keeping on and continue riding Night riding can become dangerous. Reaction and Reflexes get impaired as we age. Reaction times grow and reflexes slow more and

more. In road situations where fast actions are needed, you may not react quickly enough to avoid collisions and other unsafe situations.

Older motorcyclists have slower reaction times and are more vulnerable to everyday riding worries like overheating, dehydration, and variability of blood sugar. All these factors together mean that even though older motorcyclists are generally much more careful than young people, they're also prone to encountering potential limitations and vulnerabilities as they age,

Physical Changes

Decreased vision, hearing and body strength are common changes. Stamina and growing periods of fatigue can pen too. Chronic conditions like arthritis, back pain, and neuropathy can hamper riding abilities. Medications taken for these and other age-related conditions may cause side effects like drowsiness, dizziness, or blurred vision that impair riding safety.

tions requiring medication. High blood pressure and cholesterol, heart conditions, diabetes and other issues that need constant monitoring and medications to manage will affect your riding. Always consult with and follow your doctor's recommendations and follow them.

A few Storage Tips



properly . To store a motorcycle for winter, first wash and clean it. then change the oil and fill the gas tank with a fuel stabilizer. Next. maintain battery with a battery tender lift and

Pre-storage preparation

- Cover the motorcycle: Once everything else is done,

cover the bike with a breathable motorcycle cover. A quality cover will protect the finish and prevent dust buildup without trapping moisture.

Storage location

- Indoor is best: Store the motorcycle in a dry, climatecontrolled area like a heated garage if possible. Next best option is the master, or spare, bedroom. Storing it there makes it easier to keep an eye on it. You might have to use some kind of room freshener due to gas fumes. If your significant other complains, you may have a tough decision to make.
- Unheated is acceptable: If a heated space isn't available, an unheated garage or a storage shed is better than storing it outdoors.
- Outdoor storage: If you must store it outside, use the best quality, waterproof, and breathable cover you can find and place it in a sheltered location.

Helmets Anyone?



In Illinois riding with a helmet, or without, is your decision to make. But, as you ride out of state you may not have that choice. If you are going on a longer trip check to see what the helmet laws are in the states you will travel through. Almost all foreign countries require a helmet. If you will be required to have a helmet think about what will suit you best when you make a purchase.

As of a May 2025 update, 17 states and the District of Columbia have mandatory helmet laws for all riders, including Alabama, California, Georgia, Louisiana, Maryland, Massachusetts, Mississippi, Nebraska, Nevada, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, Oregon, Tennessee, Vermont, Virginia, Washington, and West Virginia. The remaining states have partial laws, typically requiring hel-

mets only for riders under a specific age, while three Perhaps the biggest surprise is states—Illinois, Iowa, and New Hampshire—have no hel-

Buying a Motorcycle Helmet



Shopping for a motorcycle helmet can be a daunting task. With so many options and ratings information out there, it can be hard to know where to start. Maybe the following guide might help make your search easier.

Motorcycle Helmet Types

There are three common categories of motorcycle helmets. Picking the one with the most protection will keep you the safest on the road.

- Half helmets offer the lowest amount of protection. Your face will be fully exposed. Only the most experienced riders should even consider this option.
- Open helmets provide a middle ground of protection. They cover your ears, part of your jaw, and sometimes offer a visor as well. This choice is also best left to the most experienced riders.
- Full-face helmets cover the largest amount of your face and also offer durable face shields. These helmets will be heavier, but you can find models with plenty of padding to ensure wearing them is comfortable.

Helmet Ratings

The various tests are hoping to measure a few different traits. Impact looks at how well the helmet absorbs shock. Penetration looks at how it handles hitting a sharp object. Retention relates to how well the chin strap stays closed. Peripheral vision looks at how well the motorcycle rider can see on both sides.. These features all affect how well the helmet can keep you safe.

Fitting a Motorcycle Helmet

When you are in the store, you can run through various tests to see how well the helmet fits. When you move your head from side to side, it shouldn't wiggle. If you roll your head forward, it shouldn't slide down. Once you wear it for a few minutes, it shouldn't leave behind any redness or soreness. Try on a range of helmets and run these tests to find the best fit for you. Typically, helmet liners will expand as they wear in. (Continued on pg 6)

Fall road hazards for motorcycle riders include slippery surfaces from wet leaves and frost, which reduce tire traction. Reduced visibility from shorter daylight hours and leaf

piles is also a major issue, as is the increased presence of wildlife, particularly deer, on the roads. Finally, riders should watch out for hidden road (Continued on pg. 7)

pavement.

Slippery and icy conditions

- **Wet leaves:** Both wet and dry leaves create a slippery surface. Wet leaves trap water and oil, becoming as slick as ice. Dry leaves can hide what's underneath, like cold pavement, gravel, or "road alligators" (tar snakes).
- Patches of black ice are a major risk, especially on bridges and shaded areas.
- Road sealant: "Road alligators " or road sealant can be very slick when cold or damp.

Reduced visibility

- **Shorter daylight hours:** Days are shorter, and it gets dark earlier, which increases the risk of accidents.
- Leaf piles: Piles of leaves can hide road defects like potholes, sewer grates, or debris. They can also ignite when exposed to a hot exhaust pipe.

Wildlife

Animal activity: Fall is a peak season for animal activity, especially deer. Be extra vigilant, especially in rural areas.

Other road hazards

- Potholes and uneven surfaces: Leaf piles can conceal potholes and other pavement damage.
- Gravel and debris: Loose gravel or other debris on the road, particularly in farm areas, can cause a loss of traction
- **Increased traffic:** Holiday shopping and gatherings can lead to more traffic on the roads.

How to stay safe

- Adjust speed: Slow down and increase your following distance, especially on potentially hazardous roads.
- Look ahead: Scan the road well in advance for haz-
- Smooth inputs: Avoid sudden braking or turning, particularly on wet leaves.
- Be prepared: Wear bright clothing to be more visible, and be prepared for fluctuating temperatures.
- Perform maintenance: Ensure your motorcycle's brakes and lights are in good working order.

Friendly Fire?

As if we don't have enough road hazards to worry about.....Recently, Vice President JD Vance found himself ducking for cover as a shell prematurely exploded over his motorcade, sending shrapnel toward the CHP motorcycle cops tasked to escort him.

According to the New York Times, "A 155-millimeter shell fired during a live-fire demonstration for the 250th anni-

damage like potholes under leaf piles versary of the Marine Corps at Camp Pendleton on Saturand construction zones with uneven day prematurely detonated, dropping fragments of the shell on a California Highway Patrol vehicle and motorcycle that were part of Vice President JD Vance's protective detail, according to a patrol report. No officers were hurt in the mishap, which dropped shrapnel onto the vehicles parked on a ramp to a major freeway that had been ordered closed by Gov. Gavin Newsom."

CHP then closed a 17-mile stretch of the highway to assess for damage and clean up the debris. Having lived in Frost and ice: Cold nights can lead to morning frost. the area for a long time, California's notoriously bad traffic had to be apocalyptic after this.

> The shell was fired by an M777 Howitzer, which is a towable artillery canon, and was part of a demonstration of "larger exercise[s] marking the Corps' 250th anniversary, attended by Mr. Vance and Defense Secretary Pete Hegseth." The Times reports that Governor Newsom had originally objected to the plan to fire over the freeway it puts civilians in the line of fire.

> Speaking to the outlet, Lt. Col. Lindsay Pirek, a spokeswoman for the First Marine Expeditionary Force at Camp Pendleton, stated, "We are committed to determining the incident's root cause and applying findings to future missions." The demonstration was quickly halted after the premature detonation, and again, thankfully, no one was injured.


